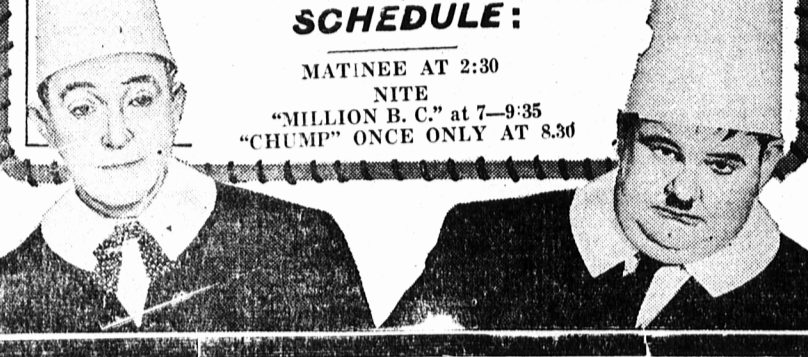

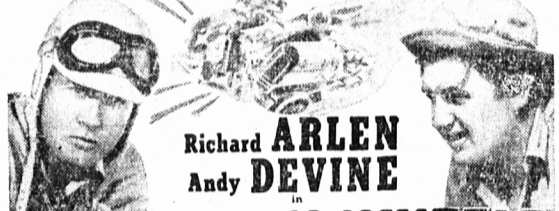

Declares U. S. Defence Outlook Is "Very Dark"

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—War Secretary Henry L. Stimson, in a prepared statement today, declared that there is a "very dark outlook" for national defence unless military service in the United States is made compulsory to meet the need for trained men. "Congress has appropriated literally billions of dollars for material to save the country, but we have not taken the step necessary to get the men to run that material," the new Secretary of War said. Meanwhile, the War Department signed a contract with E. I. Dupont Inc. and the company for construction of a \$25,000,000 smokeless powder plant near Charleston, Ind., about 12 miles from Louisville, Ky. The plant is to be owned and operated by the company on a fixed fee basis, would employ 5,000 men during construction, and several thousand when completed. Other developments on the defence front: 1. States factories had stepped up delivery of airplanes to Great Britain from three or seven a day recently, and predicted the figure would reach 14 by the end of the year. 2. General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, said the war department favors the exertion of pressure, if necessary, upon employers to keep open the jobs of men who might be called to active service in the national guard or for compulsory military training. 3. Marshall estimated that the "most modern" arms and equipment would be ready by the end of the year for the contemplated protective force of 16 regular army and national guard divisions. He said that the army is developing tanks of about 70 tons, much larger than any built before and about the size of those used in Germany's sweep across France. 4. Secretary Col. Frank King said that the navy department is "in process of overcoming" a temporary advantage that its predecessor, Charles Edison, reported had been gained by air power over sea power. Anti-aircraft defenses of existing and uncompleted warships are being strengthened, he added, in type of guns used rather than through greater armor protection.
