CAPITOL SUMMERSIDE

Increased Budget Sought By Church

PRESBYTERIAN VICTORY FUND OPENED. PLAN TO RAISE \$500,000 APPROVED IN ADDITION TO REQUEST FOR GREATER CURRENT SUPPORT.

MONTREAL, June 6 Steps to increase the budget donations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada were taken by the General Assembly yesterday afternoon, as they recommended to the Budget and Stewardship Committee were adopted. Rev. Dr. William Barclay, convener, presented the report, and made an appeal for greater interest on the part of the ministry particularly in this phase of the work.

The committee's report stated: "As the war increases in its intensity it behoves the churches to give greater heed to the tasks God has set to their hands with a view, not only of setting against the evil of the war, but also of preparing for the day when, with peace again restored, the peoples of the earth will more readily be brought into one, if the great family of Christ's church universal is in health in all its branches. May not we expect our Presbyterian people in Canada to strengthen our denominational finances at this critical moment?"

The General Assembly earlier approved a plan to raise \$500,000 to place the finances of the church on a sounder footing.

Proposed by an elder, John M. Thompson of Owen Sound, Ont., chairman of the Board of Administration in the recommendations of this body, the plan provided for paying off an accumulated deficit of \$178,466 in addition to the carrying out in full of the church's work.

A. T. Barr, St. John's, Nfld., asked the assembly to designate the fund by a "colorful name such as the 'Victory Fund' and debate on the suggestion lasted until very late in the evening. Toronto asked delegates not to obstruct the scheme because of discussion over a name.

"I would like to see the church go forward for \$1,000,000 and I think we could get it," said Rev. W. B. Mitchell of Dundas, Ont., in asking for details on the means proposed to raise the money.

Dr. A. L. Budge of Hamilton asked for support of the plan, and spoke of a "sister church which lost her endowment" and then performed a miracle of finance. Dr. Robert Johnston, Ottawa, and Dr. J. Lewis McLean, Victoria, spoke in support of the project.

Dr. Johnston said that his own congregation in Knox Church had no trouble in financing their church work during 1941.

"There is not a bit of use in indulging in a talk if there is no sacrificial effort behind it," he said, "we have not the sacrificial spirit in the church. We are a lot of glorious humbugs with regard to the financial side."

The General Assembly authorized its Board of Administration to approach representatives of other communions with a view to obtaining a modification in the Income Tax Act to provide for exemption from income tax of at least \$300 for ministers who need to use automobiles in carrying out pastoral duties.

The authorization came after Dr. J. W. MacNamara, clerk of the assembly, said that a government of the Czech protectorate, and his entire cabinet arrived for the funeral in a special train. Numerous delegations of industrial and agricultural workers also came from Bohemia and Moravia in the same train.

munique said. A third supply ship was sunk out of another convoy. A small merchant vessel, laden with explosives, also fell victim to the Turbillion in another attack.

The R. A. F. raids struck bases 900 miles apart.

Set Big Fires Big bombers, based either in Egypt or Libya, set fires visible for 70 miles around barrack buildings at the airbase of Candia, capital of the overrun Greek island of Crete last night. Explosions were observed on the runways, the R. A. F. reported.

Shipping was bombed in the Cagliari harbor at the southern tip of Sardinia, the large Italian island which lies almost midway between Spain and Italy.

Crete has long been used as a base for Axis aircraft and recent concentrations have been reported there. The Crete forces could be used not only against the British in Libya, but for a shortcut drive to the oil of Iran and Iraq through Cyprus, Turkey or Syria.
