NORTH CAROLINA BANKS ON SEAD

**RALEIGH, No. Carol., May 13**—A strange situation exists in this state where the largest branch of the commercial fishing industry, from the standpoint of catch is probably the latest known to the general public.

The North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development, in its latest report, all of the menhaden known locally as shad, fatbacks and alewife, fishing industry which is one of the great sources of revenue of the state.  
"More than 100,000,000 menhaden are taken annually by fleets of boats from North Carolina ports," the report states. "They are said to be one of the most abundant of all economic fish, migrating in enormous schools off shore. They are not a food fish, being used chiefly for the extraction of oil which serves for much the same purpose as linsed oil and scrap which is used in fertilizers and for stock feed."  
"North Carolina operates about thirty boats with which their outfits cost about \$25,000 each. Fourteen factories costing \$50,000 to \$100,000 each are operated in the state. These have cooked on an average of 30,000,000 fish each for a season of two months, November and December, for the past four years.  
"Motor boats of an average capacity of 550 tons and which are able to carry 450,000 fish are manned by a crew of 25 men, including the captain and engineer. These boats carrying two purse boats on which a large purse net 270 yards long is placed so that each boat carries about half. On sighting a school of fish these purse boats are rowed around it, dropping their nets as they go. When the fish are entirely circled, the bottom of the net is drawn together so as to form a purse which brings the fish together in a solid mass. From this mass they can be baled with a large dip scoop, operated by a donkey engine on the motor boat. At times as many as 300 fish are caught in a single purse.  
"North Carolina has averaged about 100 tank cars of oil each year for the past three years. The tank cars average about 8,000 gallons each. At present oil is selling at 48 cents per gallon and is likely to go higher before the season closes. Refiners get most of the oil as it is a very desirable drying oil. When the market is low soap companies buy most of the oil. New oil is sold on a maximum of fifty per cent, free acid.  
"The menhaden industry is and has been a great source of revenue. The great question is whether the industry is a declining one. Some authorities think so, while some of the fishermen are just as confident that it is not. The former quote statistics to show that the production is falling off and the latter will tell you that more fish were seen off the North Carolina coast last fall than ever before and that only stormy weather prevented them from making a record catch."

**KEROSENE EMULSION**  
Kerosene 2 gallons  
Laundry soap 1-2 pound  
Water 1 gallon  
Preparation: Dissolve the soap in hot water, then pour into the kerosene and churn violently with a force pump until a creamy emulsion is produced. For use dilute with nine times the amount of warm water.  
When only a very small quantity of kerosene emulsion is required, use the following mixture:  
Kerosene 1 quart  
Flour 8 ounces  
Water 2 gallons  
Preparation: Stir together the flour and kerosene, then add the water and churn briskly for five minutes. Should be used at once.

**NICOTINE SPRAY**  
Nicotine sulphate (40 per cent) 1 ounce  
(Black Leaf 40)  
Laundry soap 3 ounces  
Water 3 gallons  
Preparation: Dissolve the soap thoroughly in boiling water. When cool, add to the nicotine sulphate and water, stirring briskly.

**NICOTINE DUST**  
One pound nicotine sulphate (40 per cent) mixed thoroughly with 24 pounds hydrated lime. Apply with a hand duster. This mixture is more rapidly applied than a spray and is most effective when applied during bright sunshine. Care should be taken to avoid inhaling the fumes given off by this preparation.
