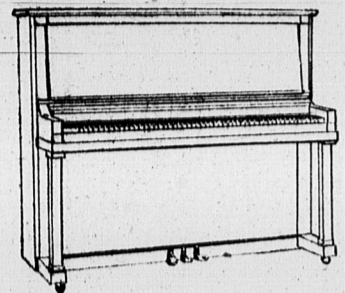

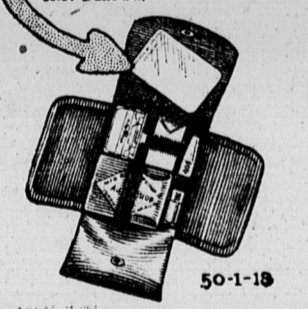

NEW CANADIAN SHIPS MUST BE ARMED

OTTAWA, April 26.—By virtue of an order-in-council, dated April 12th, the Minister of the Naval Service is empowered to give directions that any British ship, registered in Canada, shall be equipped with such apparatus for protecting it against operations of the enemy as may be specified and that the crew of the ship shall be properly instructed in the use of such apparatus.

INSANE MAN KILLS TWO AND INJURES ANOTHER

MONTREAL, April 24.—Hebech Maker an Assyrian, aged 30 years, in an insane frenzy, this afternoon killed his sister, Mrs. Joseph Sayfar, 31 year of age and her baby boy three months old, by pounding them over the head with a hammer. He tried to kill Mrs. Maloest with the same instrument, but only wounded her in the head. He hit himself in the head with the hammer, but not hard enough to cause much injury. The scene of the double murder was the home of Mrs. Sayfar, 703 Notre Dame Street East, where Maker had been boarding for about a month. He came to Montreal recently from the United States. He appeared to be insane when arrested, after his bloody work.

concerning the price of feeds and the consensus of opinion was that the ruling of the Commission relative to the control of price on feeds was in some cases not being carried out. The election of directors for the ensuing year followed:— Queens—James Gannon, David McDonald, J. H. Simpson, Kings—J. A. Dewar, M.L.A., Wm Underhay, Prince—Rev. Dr. Gauthier, D. J. Thompson, Antigonish—Wm. Kane, Meeting adjourned to meet at 7:30 p. m.

EVENING SESSION.

Rev. Dr. Gauthier presided at the evening meeting. The committee on resolutions submitted and passed the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted. "Whereas the amendment to our Militia Service Act of 1917 has been passed by an Order-in-Council calling upon men of 20, 21, 22 years of age to report at once for active service includes a number of our dairy laborers absolutely necessary for the manufacture of dairy products, and whereas the depletion of such help will seriously interfere with the manufacture of dairy products, therefore resolved that we respectfully request the Military authorities to grant leave of absence to all such laborers while engaged for the present season."

"Whereas the cost of manufacturing cheese and butter in this Province has greatly advanced since the beginning of the war owing to the increased cost of dairy supplies, labor in manufacturing as also the drawing of milk and cream to the manufacturing centres, and whereas the cost of production has also greatly advanced, owing to the high cost of feeds; Therefore Resolved that we request the Dairy Commissioner, J. A. Ruddleick, to urge upon the Dairy Commission the necessity of raising the limitation on the price of cheese and so concur with the demand of the Ontario Dairy Association.

President Gauthier in his characteristic eloquent manner introduced the subject of a closer connection between the several co-operative associations of P. E. Island, which working together under a Dominion charter would eventually result in great good to all.

He declared that there was more democracy in this little Province than in any province of the Dominion. This war is a fight for democracy or in other words a fight against selfishness. The first great Democrat was a King—born in a stable. Because men have not followed his teachings of the gospel of goodwill towards men—that is the reason why there exists this awful war today. "We must all work together as Canadians first, and brothers of one common Father. A broader co-operation is needed not only among the citizens of this Province but of all Canadians.

Mr. W. J. Kerr, of the P. E. Island Egg and Poultry Association followed with an excellent address somewhat along the same lines as Dr. Gauthier. He spoke of the success which has come to the Association. It has been brought about by the spirit of co-operation rightly applied. The spirit of selfishness must be downed. As long as it reigns in the hearts of the people we are not going to get there as a nation. There have been organizations monopolizing things which man has no business to monopolize. He was glad to say that the little co-operative organization which he has been boasting stands opposed to this sort of thing. Mr. Walter Simpson said the Dairy Association was a monument to the success of co-operation. It is the ideal way of doing business—each seeking the welfare of others as well as their own.
