DEMPSEY DIFFERENT FROM ONE YEAR AGO

LINCOLN FIELDS, Crete, Ill., Sept. 20.—Jack Dempsey, on edge today for his battle of \$3,000,000 with Gene Tunney in Soldier Field next Thursday night is as different from the Dempsey of a year ago, when he lost the world's heavyweight championship to Tunney in the rain at Philadelphia, as black is from white.

That, at least, is the verdict of observers who have watched the former world's heavyweight champion in all his battles from the time he battered Jess Willard into a helpless hulk in Toledo back in 1919 to his last engagement—his knockout victory over Jack Sharkey seven weeks ago.

Close to Real Article

If the present day Dempsey isn't the same old Dempsey of the Pipe, he is so close to the real Dempsey that his admirers hardly can distinguish the difference. Some say his victory over Sharkey caused the change; that it dispelled all doubt in his mind as to whether or not he could come back, and, having convinced himself that he still carries the old winning punch and can stand up under a punch, he is certain he can destroy the popular belief that "they never come back."

Hard to Keep Still This afternoon he lounged about his training camp and found difficulty in keeping still. He gossiped with his camp attendants, read a bit from magazines, sat in a game of cards and then strolled around the place—a picture of a fighter brim full of nervous energy and in condition.

"I know I am in the very best of condition; I feel it," Dempsey said. "When I fought Tunney a year ago I did not have a fight for three years. It took that fight and the one I had with Sharkey to bring me back. I'll regain the title. I feel sure of it."

Playfulness Returns

The sign that gives a line on Dempsey's mental and physical condition is the return of the playfulness. Time was when Dempsey would greet one of his admirers with a headlock or a playful poke in the ribs. His headlock disappeared a year ago when he was beset with lawsuits and other worries, but since his knockout victory over Sharkey the old desire to joke by wrapping his hairy arms around somebody's head and applying the pressure has returned. Some of Dempsey's admirers, this also goes for unbiased critics, say that he is 25 per cent better back, not half way, but all the way back.

WORLD SERIES OCTOBER 4

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 20.—Kenesaw Mountain Landis, baseball commissioner, tonight sent word to officials of the New York Yankees, American League pennant winners, and the four contending teams for the National League flag to meet with him here next Friday morning to arrange for the world's series.

The National League teams invited to the conference were the pace-setting Pirates, the Giants, Cardinals and Cubs.

Commissioner Landis intimated that the series would open probably on Tuesday, Oct. 4.

Giants Are Gaining On Pittsburgh

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Brooklyn snapped the winning streak of the league leading Pirates today as Dazzy Vance pitched the Robins to a 3 to 0 shutout victory at Pittsburgh halting the leaders at 11 in a row.

The New York Giants slashed the Pirates' hold on the National pennant to 3-1-2 games by winning at Cincinnati 10 to 6. The season's series with the Reds went to the Giants on a margin of 15 victories in 22 starts.

The Cardinals won their fourth straight game from the Pirates at St. Louis, 12 to 5, and thus remained at the heels of the second place Giants.

Frisch in the sixth got his 589th assist of the season, establishing a new National League record.

At Chicago, Art Nehf, starting his first game on the hill for the Cubs, held Boston to six scattered hits. The Cubs bunched his hitting, the erratic support of Charley Robertson to shutout Boston, 6 to 0.

1,000 Metres Run In 2 Mins., 25 4-5 Secs.

PARIS, Sept. 20.—The crack German sprinter, Dr. Otto Peltzer, broke the world's record for one thousand metres at a pre-olympic meet in Colombes stadium near Paris yesterday.

He covered the distance in two minutes, 25 4-5 seconds, finishing 1 1-2 metres ahead of the French Scraphin Martin, the previous record holder who beat his own record of 2 minutes, 26 4-5 seconds by four-fifths of a second.

The Markets

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 20.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain on the Montreal market continued quiet today, and the volume of business transacted was small.

The only business of importance in the local cash grain market was the sale of a few loads of tough No. 2 northern wheat at ten cents per bushel over the Winnipeg Oct. option C. I. F. Montreal. Owing to the further strength in oat futures at Winnipeg, local prices for Canadian western oats were advanced another cent per bushel. The demand was slow, No. 2 C. W. were quoted at 73 cents, and No. 3 at 70 per bushel. The local and export trade in spring wheat grades of flour was inactive but values were well maintained. The trade in winter wheat flour was steady and prices were unchanged. The market for milled was fairly active and the undertone was firm. A weaker feeling developed in the market for standard grades of rolled oats and prices were reduced fifteen cents per bag. The demand was quiet. Bags of ninety pounds were quoted at \$3.95 to \$4.10. The egg market was without any new feature to note, prices for all grades being maintained with a fair volume of business passing. The receipts were 1,920 cases. A feature of the butter trade was the easier feeling that developed and prices were reduced 1-4 cents per pound. This was attributed to the limited demand from all sources. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 38 1-4 cents to 38 1-2 cents per pound. There was no further change in the condition of the local cheese market the tone being firm, but the volume of business was small. The receipts were 13,412 boxes.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—(Eggs) A weakness on the lower grades of eggs continues to prevail in the larger consuming centres of the east, extras however, are scarce and are in good demand. The last preliminary report of the storage for September 1st, 1927 gives the date at 14,006,000 dozen as compared with 14,866,000 dozen on September 1st, 1926.

TORONTO—Extras here are firm while other grades are holding barely steady. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 46-48; firsts 42-44, seconds 34-36. Prices to retailers are extras 45-47, firsts 47, seconds 38-40. Storage eggs are moving to retailers at extras 45, firsts 42, seconds 38-40.

MONTREAL—Prices for extras here are unchanged and this grade is in demand while the lower grades are neglected. Ontario is accumulating rapidly and the paying price for these has dropped to 17 3/4-34 f. o. b. but they are not wanted here. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 45-49; firsts 41-44, seconds 32-36.

WINNIPEG—Quality of current arrivals here is showing some improvement. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 40; firsts 36, seconds 29-30. Prices to retailers are extras 46, firsts 43, seconds 31.

REGINA—Very few fresh eggs are being received here. Storage eggs are selling to retailers at extras 42 firsts 40, seconds 36.

EDMONTON—Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, extras 35-40, firsts 32-37, seconds 27-32. The poultry season is not expected to open in any volume until after harvest operations are completed.

VANCOUVER—Dealers are quoting producers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned extras 44-45, firsts 41-43, pullet extras 37. Small pullet eggs are accumulating rapidly and the paying price for these has dropped to 17 3/4-34 f. o. b. but they are not
