All Due to a Discharged Coachman.

It was announced by cable the other day that the young Queen of Holland had resumed her accustomed place at The Hague with restored health, and that her husband, Prince Henry, had returned simultaneously. This seems to be a proper occasion for contradicting all the vile scandals that were put about some months ago of alleged quarrels between Queen Wilhelmina and her husband, and of ill-treatment on his part toward herself, and of indignation in court circles at The Hague by reason thereof. The New York "Evening Post" declares that it is in a position to state that the Queen's marriage was a love match as genuine as any that ever takes place in private life, but it did not receive the sanction of the Dutch Government until the character of Prince Henry as developed from infancy to manhood was fully known. All the presumptions, therefore, are that the home-life of the Queen is a happy one. None of those who come in contact with her have ever doubted this. A rumor to the contrary was first set afloat by a discharged coachman. It was seized upon by a raging newspaper reporter, and he passed along the line, was magnified till it resembled a case of wife-beating, and necessitated the challenge to a duel sent to Prince Henry by a young nobleman, who could no longer endure the outrages heaped upon the Queen by her brutal husband. The original story of the discharged coachman was false, and all the rest was yellow journalism. Nobody in Holland who was in a position to know the facts ever believed a word of it, but all such persons were deeply mortified that such publications should be credited in other countries.

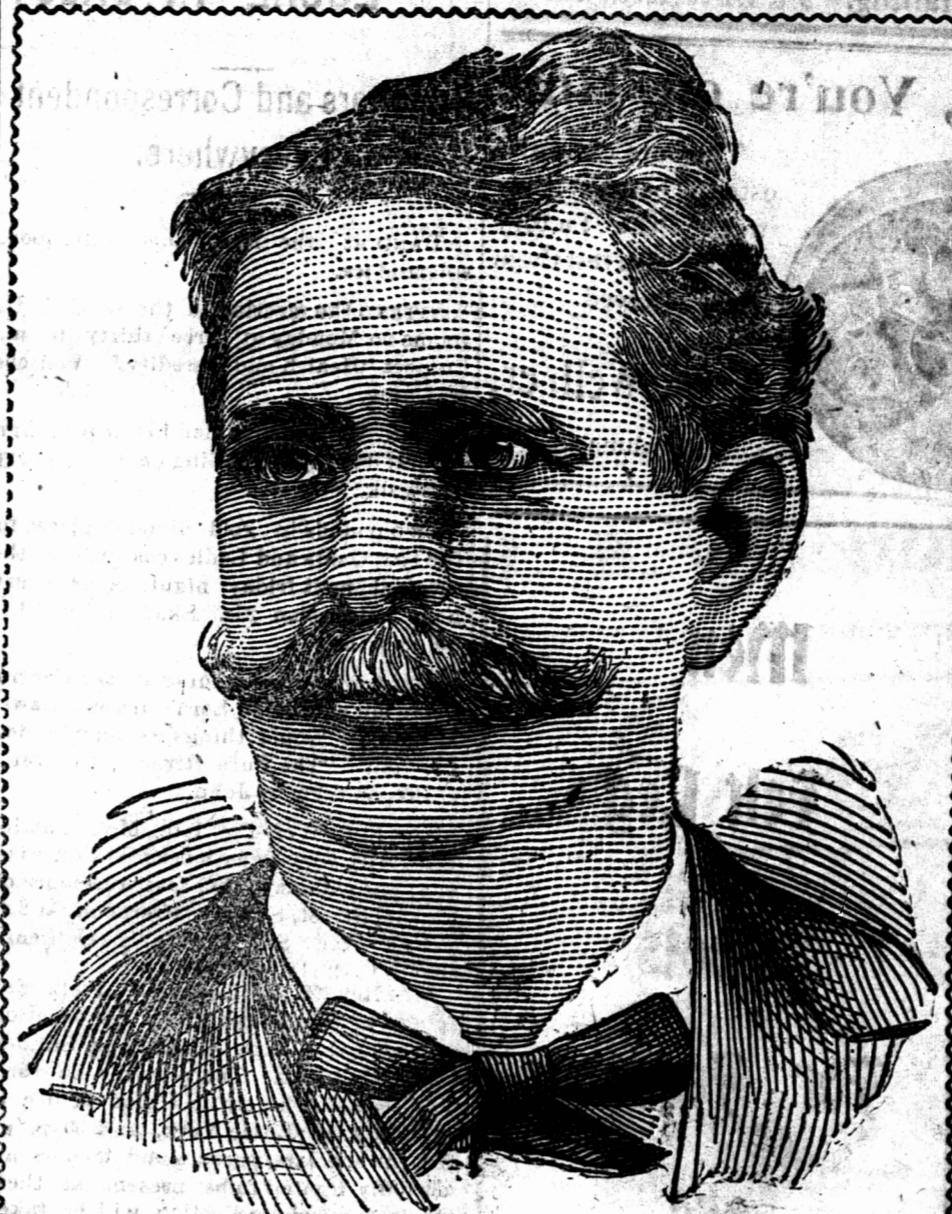

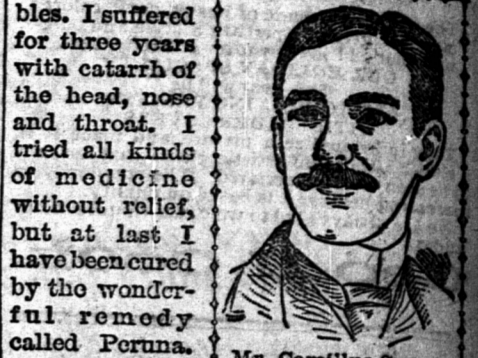
