AGAINST THE SALE OF SHODDY AS WOOLLEN GOODS.

An Epitome of the Grosvenor Bill at Washington—Our Own Laws Against Oleomargarine—Why Should Not Adulterated Woollen Goods Be Honestly Labeled and Sold For What They Are?

Some objection may be made to legislation in Canada to require all imitation of woollen goods to be marked so as to show the constituent fibres and other materials and the relative proportions of each. As an epitome of the Grosvenor Bill, introduced into the United States House of Representatives, the following extract may be quoted:—All manufactures of goods or fabrics of any kind whatsoever made in imitation of woolen goods or fabrics, or goods which when sold as woollens or woollen goods, are made or intended to be wholly of new or unused sheeps wool, shall so mark, label or tag such goods, as that they may be readily distinguished from genuine wools, or woollens, as defined in the first section of this Act.

Why should not legislation along the above lines be enacted in Canada? There is surely good precedent for such a law. Take for instance the various laws already on the statute book in reference to dairy products. Let me quote:—(a) No oleomargarine, butterine, or other substitute for butter shall be manufactured in Canada or sold therein, and every person who contravenes the provisions of this Act in any manner whatsoever, shall incur a penalty not exceeding four hundred dollars, and not less than two hundred dollars, and in default of payment shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months and not less than three months.

Why should not adulterated woollen goods be sold on their merits just as imitation or adulterated dairy products are? Some people may consider such legislations harassing, but as John Bright once said, there are people in the world who think the ten commandments the most harassing legislation that was ever enacted, because they seem to run counter to their own peculiarities so often.

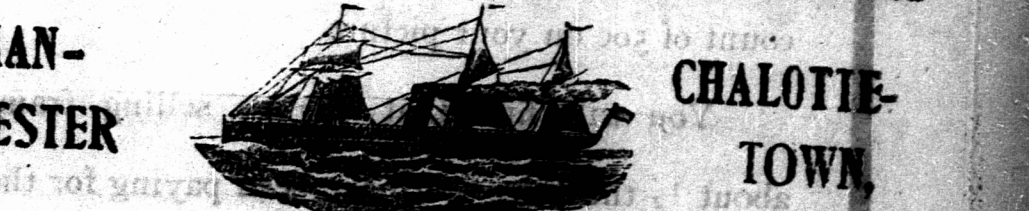
