MR. GEO. A. FREEZE, the popular Provincial Agent of the M. C. and B. and M. Railroads, with headquarters at Moncton, who has been in the city for a day or two, went to Souris yesterday afternoon and will return this morning.

The large and increasing traffic via the Plant Line steamer Halifax, and the additional steamer to be placed on the route, have made it necessary to make changes to facilitate the handling of freight and to cope with the increase in passenger traffic. The warehouse used last season has been moved to the opposite side of the wharf. A much larger one has been erected—100 feet long by 28 feet wide,—lighted with electricity. In the east end will be found the office, which will be connected by telephone. The wharf is a spacious one, having a width of 107 feet with a depth of water at low tide of 22 feet. Messrs. Poole & Lewis intend laying a first class platform, and when completed the Plant Line will have one of the finest wharves to be found in any of the eastern ports. The buildings are to be painted canary color, the color adopted by the Plant Co. on all their lines. The warehouse will have a floor capacity of 7,436 square feet. The Co. party are fortunate in having Mr. W. W. Clark as their courteous and obliging agent in this city.
