—TOWN COUNCIL.—The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday evening, the Mayor and Councillors were present. The following business was brought before the meeting: The matter of repairing the streets in front of Messrs. F. W. Strong & Co. and Messrs. Sinclair & Stewart stores. A communication was read from Messrs. Brace, McKay & Co. asking permission to install a gasoline tank at the rear of their store. This was granted on condition that said tank be installed in accordance with the fire regulations. Correspondence from the Council of London, Ontario was also read asking the support of a petition for the benefit of soldiers and those depending on them. The Town Clerk was instructed to sign and forward this petition. On application for the use of the Police Court and Firemen's rooms on Saturday, June 22nd for the purpose of registration under National Registration Act, permission was granted. Dr. A. W. Leard was appointed to fill the vacancy on the School Board. The meeting adjourned to the 28th inst.—L.

—METHODIST MEETING.—On Wednesday, June 5th the annual district meeting of the Summerside district of the Methodist Church met at Kensington. The following clergy men being in attendance, Revs. J. M. Rice, Geo. Ayers, Geo. Morris, G. A. Sellar, G. J. Leard, H. S. Young, E. E. Styles and R. M. Brodie. The chairman of the district Rev. Geo. Ayers, of Bequete, opened the proceedings with devotional exercises, after which the usual inquiry concerning each member was gone through. The result being no objections or charges in any case. On Thursday morning the lay-delegates from most of the circuits met with the ministers at 9 a. m. The proceedings of the day included a motion to the General Conference requesting that the salary of the ministers be \$1200. The Rev. G. Morris was elected as delegate to the stationing committee, with Rev. H. S. Young as alternative. The work done for the year was read by the secretaries, which is as follows: 41 increase in membership, 185 Baptisms, 82 marriages, 84 burials, General Missionary \$2,850.60, Educational \$250.70, Women's Missionary \$2,512.18. Total for all purposes \$12,092.79. The Sunday School report revealed an increase in 23 departments. The next annual meeting was settled to be held at O'Leary.
