Synagog of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations THE sole head of a family in any one over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry fee may be made at any Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions. -Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. -A homestead may be granted in each of three years after entry has been made, also 70 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption cannot be obtained as well as homestead status, in certain districts. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Dominion land may be taken in each of three years after entry has been made, also 70 acres extra cultivation.
