—The placing of the last section on the stand pipe in connection with the water and sewerage system Summerside, was finished yesterday morning and about noon a flag was hoisted on the top of it, signifying that the work was completed. Yesterday afternoon the chief of the fire department the contractor and the engineers made a test of the power from the hydrants in company with the commissioners, at different sections of the town with a pressure of eighty-three lbs at the power house water was thrown a distance of two hundred and ten feet from an inch and a quarter nozzle. The average distance which the water was thrown ranged from one hundred and eighty feet in the upper part of the town to two hundred and ten feet. The latter distance being at the west end of the town near Hinton's tannery. Considerable air was found in the pipes and when this is washed out the distance of which the water will be thrown should be much farther than at the test yesterday. With the exception of a few minor details the system is about completed and ready to be transferred to the town, which transfer will likely take place about the first of next week.
