League-Leading Recce Juniors Defeat Kinsmen 10-2 In Game Last Night

Two home runs, two doubles and five other well scattered hits gave the league-leading Recce Juniors a 10-2 victory over the Kinsmen at the Memorial Field last night.

The league-leading Recce team gave their ace right-hander, Donnie MacLean, great support both at bat and in the field as only two errors were chalked up against them. Young MacLean pitched a stellar four hit ball game walking none, hitting one and striking out four batters.

Gerth Crockett, who started for the losers, gave up six hits, walked three, hit one and struck out six before he was relieved in the sixth inning by Jackie Cairns with but one Recce player out. Cairns was treated in the same way by the Recce batters as he was found for three hits in his one and two-thirds hurrying assignment.

The Recce opened the scoring parade in the first inning as they showed one run across the plate on a walk, a base hit, and an infield out. They added to their lead in the fifth on Eddie Lund's double, an infield out and MacCallum's home run into right field. The Kinsmen broke into the scoring in the sixth on a home run into right field in the fourth on Kennedy's triple and a wild pitch. The Recce added two more runs in the fifth frame on a walk and Glen Matheson's home run into right field in the last half of the inning. Kinsmen scored another run on a hit batter, an error and a passed ball. Then the Recce served up matters to the sixth inning as they added nine batters to the plate and scored four runs on a walk, four errors, three hits and a fielder's choice. This big outburst ended the scoring for the encounter.

Leading hitter during the game was Arnold McCallum who collected a single, a double and a home run in three times at the plate. Glen Matheson banded out a home run and drove in three runs while Eddie Lund hit a double for the extra base hits for the winners. Big gun in a losing cause was Charlie Kennedy who had a triple and a double in three times at bat.

The win by the Recce Juniors kept alive playoff chances of the Knights of Columbus team who are the third entry in the three team loop.

The winners' fielding gems came by way of "Sp" Ready's two sensational catches in right field off two hard hit balls from the bats of Cairns and Crockett. Earl Corish made a brilliant running catch in left field on a drive by Reggie Hughes in the fifth inning for another fielding gem. Giant Australian Sculler Is Winner Of Singles Championship

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(CP)—Mervyn Wood, Australia's giant sculler, romped off with the Olympic singles championship today and the United States eight rowed brilliantly to defeat Britain and run to six their series of victories since the 1920 Olympics.

There was a free-for-all scramble for the seven rowing championships, watched by 20,000 spectators along the 1,900-metre course on the Thames.

Britain and the United States scored doubles. Britain won the double-sculls and pair-without-coxswain. The United States added the fours-with-coxswain title to the eights championship.

Elsewhere the "forgotten sports" of the Olympics drew more attention.

There was no lull in the feuding over Saturday's 400-metre relay and protests over fixed rudders on canoes were laid, long before the paddlers got into action Wednesday.

The Canadian advisory committee came out with a statement saying there must be more enthusiastic support if they are to get far in international competition.

All this failed to overshadow the excitement and drama at Henley-On-Thames.

Wood, the handsome Australian police fingerprint expert, was never seriously threatened in winning the coveted singles title. Romania's Catalista of Italy held close to the six-foot-three sculler for 500 yards, and at 700 yards Wood had only a half-length margin. Then his powerful stroke slowly pulled him into a safe lead.

Eduardo Risso of Uruguay took over second place from Catalista. California University's eight-oared crew had to fight off the British eight in the last 760 yards to win by two lengths.

The Norwegian crew, rowing in lane No. 9 against the worst current, was a worthy third, only three-quarters of a length behind the British shell.

The only crew member of the United States crew was Dave Brown who, when the shell was hoisted from the river, dropped his gold medal into the Thames.

Britain's double-barrelled rowing triumph thrilled the home-folk spectators.

South March, Ont. Aug. 9.—(CP)—Overcoming shifting shadows and beating a tricky east-west wind, Elmer Gagne of Montreal today won his first match in a Dominion of Canada Rifle Association meet.

The Montreal marksman posted a perfect score of 50 to win the Tyro Match, opening event of the six day D.C.R.A. meeting.

The Tyro Match was one of four events fired at the opening of the second meet of the Association since the war ended. Other matches were the Barlow, open to teams of four officers, the Connaught and the Tilton.

More than 600 of Canada's smartest snipers went to the first team of the 17th Recce, five mounds to participate in the shoots. Six marksmen crowded into second place in the Tyro Match. They included Gen. C. G. Strong, Newport, N. S.

Tied for third place with scores of 48 were 19 competitors and it were fourth with 47.

The Air Force beat the Army at their own game in the 600 yard Barlow Match, open to officers of Canada's three services. A team from the R.C.A.P. headquarters, Ottawa, made 184 of a possible 200 points.

Two points off the winning mark, with 182, was the Winnipeg Light Infantry Association. Third place went to the team of the 17th Recce, Squadron from Charlottetown. P. E. L. with 180 points.

The Tyro team Match was won by a quartet from the 5th Heavy Anti-Aircraft Regiment of Victoria, B. C., with 190 of a possible 200.

Nine crack shots solved the baffling variable winds in the close of the match and put 18 shots in the bull's eye at 500 yards for perfect 50 scores. A shoot-off will determine the winner.

The nine included Maj. C. F. Scantlebury, Toronto, N. S.; J. Rogers, Charlottetown, P. E. I.; sixteen scored a 49 and 52 had 48 points.

He boosted his percentage from .385 last week to .387 this week, with a total of 120 hits for 77 runs in 310 times at bat in 86 games.

Cleveland's Lou Boudreau also jacked up his average two points, to .345, remaining in second position, 42 points behind Williams. Al Zarilla of St. Louis remained in third place with 337 hits and 200 runs. Philadelphia's Phil Minton climbed to fourth with 326, dropping Walt Evers of Detroit to fifth, 317.

Others of the first 10, in order, were George Kell, Detroit, 313; Bill McCosky, Philadelphia, 311; Luke Appling, Chicago, 308; Henry Mueske, Philadelphia, 304; and Bob Dillinger, St. Louis, 298.

Vernon Stephens of Boston and Joe DiMaggio of New York shared top honors for runs batted in, with 95 apiece, and DiMaggio led for 24 home runs, and another 16 for 24 home runs, with Ken Keltner of Cleveland.
