**Western Thriller With Wallace Berry At Prince Edward**

Thrills of the pioneer West mingled with uproarious comedy bring Wallace Berry to the screen in a fast-moving drama of the great outdoors in "Wyoming," now showing at the Prince Edward Theatre.

Amid Indian battles, raids on cattle thieves and other exciting detail, played against the majestic Rocky mountains in Wyoming, Berry engages in a courtship with Marjorie Main that provides him with his most comical romance since "Min and Bill," serenades his lady-love with a harmonica and engages in comedy episodes with Leo Carrillo. The young romance is between Ann Rutherford, of the Judge Hardy Family series, and Leo Bowman.

Like its predecessor, "Red Man of Brimstone," the picture is laid almost entirely outdoors, the country about Jackson Lake, Wyoming, providing scenery of breath-taking beauty. Berry's end-man characterization is compellingly dramatic at times, whimsically humorous at others, in a story ideal for his particular talents. Miss Rutherford gives a warm portrayal and, like her sister, becomes the champion of law and order in the primitive wilds.

Henry Travers plays the crooked sheriff, Lee Bowman is intriguing as Custer's young lieutenant, and William Tenn, Stanley Fields, Donald McBride, Glenn Bevans, Sara Haden, Russell Simpson and Chief Thundercloud have interesting roles.

Included on the program is the latest News, a Community Sing-Song, and a comedy entitled Onion Puff.

**Nazis Hesitate To Risk Troops For Italy's Aid**

LONDON, Oct. 21.—(CP)—The Battle of Britain goes on. It becomes increasingly an air battle, conducted by night, against the aerial and morale. The Navy continues to control sea communication. But we cannot expect to hear much of its many activities.

Any prospect of the main armies of the British and German continuing grips in the near future has, in my view, almost disappeared. The air war may continue for a long period with only minor alterations in methods.

We are afforded an opportunity of reviewing the situation in other theatres of war, Libya and Abyssinia, of course, but potential theatres are numerous.

In Libya, Graziani is still attempting his advance base. **Story of News With Accuracy "Co-operation"**

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—(CP)—Most books about newspaperwork centre around the achievements, experiences, the foibles of someone, a giant of the newsdesk or cavalier of the diplomatic beat. In writing "A Story of News," Charles Bruce, editor of the Associated Press, tells the story of the Associated Press, Dr. Alexander Jones, first general agent for the six New York papers which banded in the seafish old forerunner of the present AP, Daniel Craig, the genius of old-time news transmission, Melville Stone, who embodied the idea of accuracy and whose name will be forever connected with that of Kent Cooper, infusing the human touch into the factual news-report, fighting for the great development of a wired photo service, and the demand for a more purposeful, shadowy figures, of whom the "pony" editor talking into his telephone, a string corker, a man riding to death on a gray mule beside Custer, dispatch beat crews under the guns of both fleets at San Francisco, and the word-cablers around the world to get news of an earthquake to New York. These figures are as essential to the story as any "name" in news history, and this book recognizes.

**WINNIPEG, Oct. 24.—(CP)**—The Dominion Government already is making plans to meet the problems of demobilization when the war is over, Hon. **OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—(CP)**—The Netherlands Military Mission in Canada will begin training Hollanders in Stratford, Ont., early in January. Col. G. J. Sas, head of the mission, told the Canadian Press today. "We plan to start with a small force of 300 men," Col. Sas said. "We will give them three months' training after which they will be transferred to the United Kingdom to join the Netherlands Legion there and a new lot will begin training at Stratford in April."

**OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—(CP)**—Supt. A. N. Eames, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, will be stationed in Halifax, N.S., to command the R.C.M.P. command, succeeding assistant commissioner F. J. Mead, who was made known at R.C.M.P. headquarters today. Col. R. C. Cadiz, officer commanding one of the units, has been promoted to deputy commissioner of the force at Ottawa. He succeeds Col. G. A. King, who is retiring on superannuation.

**LONDON, Oct. 23.—(CP)**—The Ministry of Transport today ordered 2,000 motor buses from provincial cities brought to London to help solve the traffic problems of the capital. The Ministry also announced an approximate six per cent increase in railway fares, effective on season and workers' tickets. A 10 per cent increase was made Jan. 5.

**LONDON, Oct. 23.—(CP)**—Cable—Ralph Ingersoll, editor of the New York newspaper PM, said at a press conference today that he had found on a tour of London's bombed areas less damage to obvious targets than he had expected. But behind these modest gains, he said, was a more serious damage to non-military objectives than he had expected would be the case. The New York editor compared the complete freedom with which he was touring London and the country with the restrictions placed on newspapermen in Germany. He said PM's Berlin representative reported he was permitted to visit bombed places only when conducted.

**News of 1811**

The story of newsgathering is traced in action. In 1811 young Sam Topliff was in charge of the Exchange Coffee House Reading Room in Boston. When a burglar sighted chancing the harbor entrance at night, Topliff climbed into a rowboat and went out to sea. He was "written by" by the naval vessels in American waters. "Topliff in his rowboat had started systematic news gathering," writes Granning.

Similarly, when David Hale, in 1828, had trouble in New York with the nine original New York papers who were "written by" by the collection of rowboats who ever pulled an oar, concerned more with crushing opposition than gathering intelligence, Hale started his own sloop. "Hale and his Journal of Commerce had introduced the vital stimulant of competition into the sluggish world of news gathering."

It was Hale who first went to James Go. doo Bennett to talk news co-operation. "They pooled their resources to cover the Mexican War in 1847, and out of that idea a year later came the old New York Associated Press. Halifax was the focal point for the gathering of foreign news, and there Daniel Craig was established as the first Associated Press foreign correspondent. Craig had introduced the use of carrier pigeons in American news-gathering; he was full of ideas. He is credited with being the first man to send the Bible in order to hold a telegraph wire. That was at Halifax, about 1849. Before the extension of the wire from Saint John to Halifax, he had organized the Halifax Express, a horse-and-rider news relay service between Halifax and Digby, where fast boats wended to carry the copy to the wire terminal across the Bay of Fundy.

It was Craig also who issued the order, after he became "general agent" that if a story was important enough to warrant details the details were worth the wire costs. This put an end to sending bare facts for an editor at the expense of the wire to pad out from imagination. This was a sensation at the time.

By this time the New York Associated Press had begun to expand and sell its news to a number of outside papers, but these still had little or nothing to say about the news they got, no shadow of control in the organization. Reorganization came in 1856, but Granning writes—"It was a union of seven morning papers, and the news collected was designed solely to meet the needs, without any consideration for wants of subscriber papers."

**WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. VA., Oct. 24.—(AP)**—Paul B. West, president of the Association of National Advertisers, said today United States businessmen are planning larger advertising budgets to keep step with anticipated wage gains. A survey of A. N. A. members, including many of the largest advertisers in the country, West said, showed at least 50 per cent proposed to spend more money on advertising in 1941 than this year.

**NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—(AP)**—The 75-ton German passenger liner Erika, seized by Netherlands authorities at Curacao when Germany invaded Holland, has been chartered to Great Britain and will sail shortly for England, the Maritime Register said tonight.

**QUEBEC, Oct. 24.—(CP)**—A suggestion that Premier John Bracken of Manitoba be given a post in the Dominion Agricultural Ministry was made here today by E. Prefontaine, Liberal member of the Manitoba Legislature for Carleton, during an address at the 16th annual convener of the union of Canadian Catholic farmers.

**BARRIE, Ont., Oct. 24.—(CP)**—Hon. Dr. Duncan McArthur, who was sworn in as Ontario Minister of Education on Aug. 27, yesterday was elected by acclamation as Liberal member of the Ontario Legislature for Simcoe Centre.

**WINNIPEG, Oct. 24.—(CP)**—Total pay for recruits taking compulsory military training will amount to approximately \$8,640,000 during the next year, Major J. Q. Gillan of the Royal Canadian Army Pay Corps, said here last night. Total pay for all Canadian troops amounted to nearly \$500,000 a day.

**Convicted of Fraud Feeding Stuffs Act**

At the sessions of the Peace, Quebec City, recently, Messrs. LeChance and Morel, Ltd., produce merchants, were found guilty and fined on four charges under the Dominion Feeding Stuffs Act. They were fully using the registration number of another company; (2) Fraudulently lessening the value of a feeding stuff; (3) Legally having in possession for sale in Canada feeding stuff containing injurious weed seeds in excess of the legal tolerance; (4) Selling and having in possession for sale feeding stuffs mislabeled or representing. Fines of \$50 and costs were imposed on each of the first two counts, and \$5 and costs each on the third and fourth count.

Through a broker or dealer, Messrs. LeChance and Morel purchased oil cake meal manufactured and properly labeled by a well-known Company of Montreal, un-stamped the bags, thus releasing the bags, admitted about 15 to 20 per cent of ground screenings, resealed the bags including the original tags, and offered the product for sale. Furthermore, to label the additional volume thus created, they had tags printed in the name of another company.
