Feller Hurls Four-hit Ball To Blank Tigers And Give Tribe Eighth Straight Victory

NEW YORK, Sept. 6—(AP)—Bob Feller's four-hit pitching performance stretched Cleveland's winning streak to eight games today as the Indians blanked Detroit Tigers 6-0 in the first of two game series in Detroit.

Feller drove two Cleveland runs across the plate with a pair of singles. He struck out six Tigers and walked five. Only one Detroit runner reached third base. At Washington the Senators unveiled a new pitching prospect, 22-year-old Rene Montague, and he hurled them to a 7-5 triumph over Boston Red Sox.

Montague, a subby Cuban from Trenton of the eastern league was nicked for 14 hits but proved effective in the pinch. He fanned Jimmy Foxx with the bases loaded in the eighth and struck out nine altogether. Foxx previously had hit his 40th home run.

Monty Stratton, making his first start since he twisted his ankle almost two weeks ago, pitched a five-inning outburst in the seventh inning clinched victory for the Sox.

TORONTO, Sept. 6—Robert M. Gray maintained his mastery over Canada's veteran golfers today, winning the 4th year senior championship for the third time in four years with a 36-hole score of 77-77-154. He was eight strokes better than any other marksman in the field of 160.

Gray, member of the Rosedale Club, Toronto, and years ago one of Ontario's outstanding amateurs, became eligible for the seniors competition four years ago when he reached the age of 55. He won the championship that year, did not defend it in 1936, but came back to the top last year.

Today, while his closest challengers lost precious strokes to par on the windy Toronto Golf Club course, Gray posted his second consecutive 77, there was no win easily. He was the only player yesterday or today to break 80.

Ralph C. Smith of Montreal placed second with 80-82-162 and E. L. Anderson of Guelph, secretary of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, was third with 82-82-164.
