# LIBERALS GATHER IN OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—(C.P.)—From every Province of the Dominion, representatives are gathering here to attend the annual meeting of the National Liberal Federation of Canada which commences tomorrow and will continue for two days.

It is stated officially that the meeting will concern itself with matters of business and organization, having in mind the possibility of a general election during the coming year.

Under the Presidency of Hon. Vincent Massey, who has headed the National Liberal Federation since its organization, the meeting will open tomorrow afternoon. Mr. Massey will preside at the sessions during the two days of meeting, and Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Dominion Liberal Leader, will be present, address the meeting and take part in discussions.

Liberal women as well as the young Liberals of Canada, will be represented at the meeting. Senator Odette Wilson, Vice President of the National Liberal Federation, Mrs. W. C. Kennedy, of Windsor, and Miss Beatrice Belcourt of Ottawa will attend as representatives of the National Federation of Liberal women. The women's and men's branches of the twentieth Century Liberal Association will be represented respectively by Miss Odette Lapointe, of Quebec and R. A. MacDonnell of Woodstock, Ont.

The meeting will bring together many of those prominent in Liberal party throughout Canada. The representation from Nova Scotia will include Premier A. L. MacDonnell, Hon. J. L. Ralston, a member of the Mackenzie King Government, and William Duff, Federal member for Antigonish-Guyverton. Among those coming from New Brunswick is J. E. Michaud, of Ed-

# To Active Brain Pays Penalty

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—(C.P.)—A child who passes the entrance at 10 or 11 years of age seems to be due, generally speaking, for a breakdown of some sort before he comes of age, the report of Chief Inspector D. D. Mosher, as indicated in the annual report of heads of departments of the Board of Education for 1932.

Information which he sought some years ago throughout the province concerning the future progress of boys and girls who obtained entrance standing at 10 or 11, completed their pass matriculation at 15 or 16, showed that 75 per cent of them broke down, either physically, mentally, morally or all three before they reached 21 or 22 years of age, he reported. Of the remaining 25 per cent many were kept at home for a year. A few suffered no ill effects.

Suggestions and comments on general and specific problems were made by various public school inspectors. Dr. N. S. MacDonald proposed that the department of Education increase its services by organizing courses of lectures for parents in child training and pre-school education, the revision and improvement of text books from time to time—"long overdue with several of the present texts"—by "selecting" candidates from the secondary schools for training in the normal schools as teachers and by making available to teachers through booklets and frequent circulars the latest ideas and movements in education.

Referring to the continuance of school at Hillcrest from 2:30 to 4 p. m. when pupils complete work which would ordinarily be finished at home and receive help in solving the difficulties of the day, he said: "It is hoped that this plan will eliminate the assignment of any home work which might cause anxiety to the child."

# Cattle Reach England Safely

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 1.—Resuming the route of transportation by which Englishmen were wont to get buffalo meat in the days when buffalo roamed the Canadian prairies, they will now sit down to a meal of Canadian beef which have lately travelled the old route of the Hudson Bay Company's vessels from Churchill to London, Eng. With this difference, however, that the meat will be on the hoof, whereas the buffalo were shipped, probably in quarters. Two hundred head of beef cattle recently were shipped from Churchill by the Hudson Bay route to Birkenhead, Eng., which place they reached fourteen days out from Churchill. The cattle were originally shipped over the Canadian National Railways from Prince Albert, Sask., which involved a "rail journey" of only about 700 miles in place of approximately 1900 miles if they followed the usual rail route before being placed on board ship. Reports from England state the cattle were received in good condition, some actually gaining in weight.

London meat merchants are greatly interested in the experiment as 75 per cent of the beef from the cattle will be sold in the retail shops in the metropolitan area.

# Fall Rye In Canada

The area estimated as sown to fall rye in Canada for 1934 is 422,100 acres, a decrease of 50,300 acres or 11 per cent. By provinces the acreages are as follows with last year's figures within brackets: Ontario 56,300 (56,300); Manitoba 34,400 (37,800); Saskatchewan 240,000 (284,000); Alberta 81,600 (114,300).

# Prairie Forage

Crested wheat grass as a hay and pasture crop has shown greater superiority in the forage crop work at the experimental station at Reservoir, Sask., and much promise is being given by mixtures of crested wheat and other grasses and clovers. At Scott, Sask., crested wheat grass is also being grown for hay, pasture and seed production, while extensive work is being done to determine the best variety to plant at stations in Alberta. Considerable progress has been made with a large number of forage projects, while at Brandon, Man., particular efforts are being directed towards the production of forage best fitted to the needs of the prairie provinces.
