Money Voted For Propaganda

LONDON: May 1.—The Russian Liberation Committee has received a message from Helsinki, dated April 25th, saying the council of people's commissaries has rescinded a vote of 300 million roubles (nominally fifty million dollars) for propaganda in France. Instead they voted 1,500,000,000 roubles (nominally \$250,000,000) monthly for Bureau of General Foreign Propaganda. The first payment of 500,000,000 roubles for the month of February was sent to the Sinn Feiners in Ireland, the second for the month of March will be sent to Spartacans in Germany.
