Riley, of Wilnot, occurred at the Prince County Hospital on Monday night after suffering 2 and a half years from the effects of a shell wound in the spine received in Flanders while on active service. Deceased was only 28 years of age and enlisted soon after the war broke out. The funeral took place Wednesday afternoon.—L.

After the ceremony the happy couple left amidst congratulations for the home of the bride's parents where a reception took place which was much enjoyed. The newly wedded couple then left for Howlan where they will reside. Their many friends wish them every success.

"HOME FOR BURIAL.—The remains of the late Miss Lucy Smith, who died in New York arrived at her home in Georgetown on Saturday last, and the funeral took place on Monday morning to St. James R. C. cemetery. Messrs Harrigan and Devoir, of New York, brothers-in-law of the deceased accompanied the remains as well as her brother Mr. John Smith. The deepest sympathy is felt for Captain Smith and family for the loss they have sustained. The deceased who was 23 years of age was a young lady of high character and ambition and blameless life, and was very popular among her friends and acquaintances to whom the news of her death will come as a shock. She leaves to mourn besides her parents, five sisters: Mrs. Devoir, and Mrs. Harrigan, of U. S. Soldier's Letter

Mr. Ronald Yoston, of Georgetown, has received the following letter from his son:—

France, October 9th, 1918.

Dear Dad,

Just a line or two today in answer to yours of the 3rd, 1918, which I received about a week ago, but did not have a chance to answer until now. Glad to hear that all the folks are well and enjoying life. Except for a slight dose of cold I am fine and dandy, but a fellow can't help having a cold out here these days, as all his sleeping is done either in the open or else in small funk holes and as the weather is not any too warm a fellow's sleeping quarters is far from being the most comfortable place in the world.

Well Dad we have just had another big scoop and no doubt you have seen an account of it all in the papers. It was pretty stiff fighting and as usual we were in the hardest part of it, in fact the whole offensive hung on the success of our operations and it proved the greatest victory for the Canadians of any battle they ever took part in. The papers don't say much about it, but we all knew what a task it was that they were to perform. However we pulled it off successfully and gave Fritz an awful beating and with Bulgaria out of it also Turkey it begins to look like peace at last and no one will be sorry, but I am afraid we will still have another winter of it, but Fritz knows he is beaten but his stubborn nature won't admit it. The amount of prisoners, guns and material we have captured since August is something enormous and I can't see where the enemy gets his reserves from to enable him to put up such a stiff resistance, but the part of the line we were operating on was the most important link in the defence system and his troops were instructed to hold to the death. We were opposed by three times as many men strength and the amount of machine guns he had opposed to us was something awful but in spite of his elaborate defence system of wire, tunnels, etc. we smashed through and now he has either to retreat for miles or else make a stand when he has no battle positions prepared. The enemy casualties were very great and we suffered quite heavily too but that would be expected as we were on the offensive. I was lucky enough to come through it all without a scratch, so ought to feel thankful.

Well Dad how is everything around the old Town, as dull as usual I suppose. No I did not hear that Pte. Morrison was wounded or not, I have not seen any of the Battalion for quite a long while so I can't say how all our boys are.

Well Dad the parcel you mentioned was not turned up so far, hope it has not been stolen like the rest. Will let you know when it does arrive. I must ring off for now and do some work, so give my best love to all and sincerely hope to be back home in the near future. Tell Joeto write soon, so Au Revoir for now. Lovingly JACK.
