**THE SUMMERSIDE MEETING.**

The Summerside meeting on Tuesday night to receive the report of the Delegates on their recent mission to Ottawa was a large and representative one, most serious and attentive throughout and gave liberal applause to the several speakers. It was, we have reason to believe, a capital meeting for the Tunnel movement. Much light was thrown on the question in a convincing way and many imaginary

objections answered so effectually that they are not likely to be seriously presented hereafter. Prince County may be proud of the fact that three of its Delegates went to Ottawa on this mission at their own charges. The whole Island is to be congratulated on the fact that the Delegates from Prince manfully put out of sight all merely sectional and party considerations and from the first and throughout their mission spoke and acted as representatives of the entire Island, taking an entirely highminded and patriotic

course in that regard which is beyond all praise.

We have before spoken of the appreciation extended to the delegates in the cities of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia by the members of the Government and of Parliament by the press and Boards of Trade. It was most flattering to themselves personally as well as to the people of the Island who sent them. And the Delegates must congratulate themselves on the cordial and appreciative reception accorded them on their return. To the unanimous votes of thanks given them by the public meeting in the Market Hall in this city and by the Charlottetown Board of Trade there was added on Tuesday night the standing vote of thanks by the people of Summerside. Never before in the Island's history was a delegation thus honored on its return home from a mission to the federal capital. We take it as conclusive proof that our people are in earnest and also hopeful in the great enterprise of securing continuous and efficient steam communication with the Mainland by means of the Tunnel.

**THE TUNNEL MAKING HEADWAY.**

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is to have running powers over the Government Railway system. The Tunnel at the Capes will when constructed connect the Island Railway with the Government roads on the Mainland. Mr Hays, Manager of the Grand Trunk has come to see that the construction of the Tunnel would give his system direct access to this fertile Province. As a natural consequence he has pledged his powerful influence to get the federal Government to construct the Tunnel. We have all along contended that the Tunnel should have been included in the Grand Trunk scheme, which without it, was barren of direct benefit or promises of benefit to this Province. But it is not yet too late to fill in what was then omitted. All Canada is now awakening to the necessity of supplying the missing link at the Capes, and the Tunnel will do that. Every day is bringing influential support to the Tunnel project, now that it has been demonstrated to be, in the words of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, "reasonably practicable."

**THE LIBRARY MOVEMENT.**

One generous man years ago built and endowed a library which unrolled the ample page of knowledge to Andrew Carnegie when he was young. Carnegie was grateful, and he promised himself that should he become rich he would devote his money to building libraries so that all might have the benefit of books. Already Mr. Carnegie has built 1,352 libraries in every English-speaking country from Scotland to New Zealand. His libraries exist in every State of the American Union excepting only Rhode Island and Kansas, which are yet to be supplied. Other States have from two each upward. Texas has 20, Massachusetts 21, Pennsylvania 34, Indiana 30, California 46, Iowa 54, Illinois 60 and New York 120 Carnegie libraries. These libraries in the United States have cost the donor in round figures \$30,000,000 and over \$10,000,000 more has been expended by him on libraries in other countries. How great an impetus was thus given to the library movement by the man who established the library in which Mr. Carnegie devoured the volumes and became grateful!

**THE DRUGGIST'S CLAUSES.**

Sir,—It is reported that the doctors in Charlottetown have signed a protest against the House passing the Alliance amendments to the Prohibition Act in so far as they apply to their prescriptions. I commend these gentlemen for their wisdom. Certificates at ten cents each—some signed by the office boy, others signed without a date, others signed in blank, and some given over the telephone to Vendors—surely should not see the light of day. No wonder they do not want the Inspector to see them; no wonder the druggists do not want to swear to the returns. The Grand Division and its subordinates may ask for the amendments; the Alliance and kindred societies may ask for them, but the profession must be heard. If Charlottetown alone was interested in the matter it would be bad enough, but think of this condition all over the Province (as soon as this act comes in force) with boys opening drug stores with six months experience compounding drugs and others on wheels between Stanley and Kensington and many others no more reputable. For decency's sake I trust the House will have too much respect for itself to listen to the protest.
