

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 16, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section 160 acres, more or less.

Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on the conditions by the father, certain son, daughter, brother or sister of any intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans. (1) At least six months residence upon the cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his residence duties by living with the father, or mother.

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined, as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent of the district of such intention. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.

THE SECRET OF STRONG LIFE.

The Bishop of London visited the Duke of York's school and delivered an address on "The Secret of a Strong Life." General Lord William Seymour presided. The Bishop said that there were five secrets of a man's influence in the world. First he must be absolutely straightforward. It was not enough for them to have no card up their sleeve; they must obviously have no card there. They must be straightforward in all the activities of life. Games were good for their minds and bodies and English people were proud of their reputation for straightforwardness in games; in fact, that they played the game. What was wanted in Russia was the straightforward manly games they had in England; then perhaps no bombs would be thrown. Secondly they must have no 'side' or what was called in America 'putting on frills.' Thirdly, that they would never have a wide influence over mankind unless they possessed a sense of humor. Without that they might take offence at any trifle. The sense of humor was, he believed, a gift of God, but they must keep it clean. Fourthly, they must have sympathy, trained, broad, intelligent, and loving. In going his midnight march on Saturday through the slums, his sympathy was aroused by the sight of a hundred and fifty young men, some of them mere lads, more than half of them drunk, and some very drunk. That was a sight which would have stirred them up to any efforts in the cause of temperance. He blessed God for the Army Temperance Society and hoped the boys of that school would all join it. He hoped they would, at any rate, be on the side of the growing temperance movement which was doing so much for the British army. Lastly, they must have faith, for that was of all the greatest secret influences, faith in God, in a Divine Being who was working out everything for good.
