Her hat and shoes were in matching shades. Miss LeClair was dressed in a wine satin gown with matching hat and shoes. Rev. Fr. Eugene Murray performed the ceremony. Immediately after the marriage the wedding party had breakfast at the bride's home, after which they motored to Summerside to the home of the groom, where a dinner was given in their honour which was attended by a large number of friends. Mr. and Mrs. MacNeill will make their home in Charlottetown. The bride was the guest of honour at several little functions

at the recent fox show in Charlottetown but the majority were considerably below the average of Island shows.

Particularly striking was the fact that full and extra pale silvers were predominant. This was due to the fact that American markets are demanding a completely silvered pelt; even more so than our extra pale silver carry on Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Hancock visited several fur houses and retail stores and silver fox capes and muffs were very much in evidence. These are made preferably from full fox skins with no black or very little showing on the garment. These capes require from two to four skins. Fur is also used on full length coats down the entire front. These facts led to the selection of an extra pale silver fox as the most valuable animal on exhibition at the show from a pelt standpoint. The show management had offered a prize for the animal with the best pelt.

Dr. Young, president of the American National Fox Breeders Association when presiding this award and displayed a very fine specimen of the half silver type, which he said would have captured the trophy a few years ago.

Full Silvers Not Encouraged  
Dr. Young stated that although the full silvers were at present the most valuable fox to breed for the American market, the Association is not encouraging the ranchers to breed to this extreme, but rather to reserve some of their choice half silvers in case future markets demand a darker pelt.

The officials put on a banquet at which there were over seventy foxmen from as far as Utah. The show and banquet were sponsored by the Ohio Fox Breeders' Association. Mr. Hancock was a guest speaker. Incidentally it is interesting to note that Mr. Hancock was the first Secretary of this Association.

Mr. Hancock gave an interesting address on fur farming on Prince Edward Island and answered many questions in regard to breeding. The United States ranchers are

not employing the shed system of growing and furring foxes, due Mr. Hancock believes to lack of knowledge regarding this method as employed in P. E. Island.

From evidence on numerous ranches visited by Mr. Hancock, it would seem that this system would be even more advantageous to the American rancher than the Canadian ranchers.

Handling Pelts  
The American Fox Breeders Association last year handled some 92,000 silver fox pelts with an average price of \$52 a pelt. This represents 80% of the silver fox pelts produced in the United States. The American National Fox Breeders Association handles furs for their members at cost, along similar lines to the Canadian National Fox Breeders Association, but with this difference that the American rancher signs a five year contract with the Association to deliver to the Association all pelts produced and marketed. These contracts enable the Association to lay plans for several years ahead and also to go after new markets knowing that they are sure of a certain number of skins. This system has proven satisfactory to both rancher and Association.

Saw "Anne of Green Gables"  
During his visit Mr. Hancock had the pleasure of seeing the film version of "Anne of Green Gables," which is now playing in leading cities in the United States. He said the picture is taking well and is a great advertisement for Prince Edward Island. The stage settings, depicting the Island homes, were a very true portrayal of the Island's farm homes but the outdoor scenes with two exceptions were not at all like Prince Edward Island. Only in one, a river scene and a roadside setting with apple blossoms, could anyone familiar with the Island associate with the original background in the story.

Mr. Hancock, who is a keen sportsman, attended the Ohio State and the Michigan University Football game, where there was an attendance of 70,000 people. Ohio State won the match. This team is rated by critics as being the second strongest team in the United States, and is only superseded by Minnesota, winner of the big ten championship in the Middle West. Mr. Hancock is himself a graduate of Ohio University.—S

### VISITED FOX CENTRES

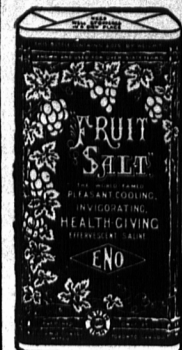
As stated yesterday, Mr. Lowell Hancock, manager of the International Fox & Animal Feeds, returned by plane Wednesday evening from an interesting visit to various cities in the United States and Canada. Following are additional particulars:

Mr. Hancock saved a whole day by taking the plane at Montreal, as he did not leave Montreal until 8 p. m. on Tuesday and was in Summerside shortly after 4:30 p. m. on Wednesday, which he considered fast travelling.

Mr. Hancock had an interesting conference with Professor Oscar Erf who has charge of the Dairy Research Work at Ohio University, at Columbus. Professor Erf acts in an advisory capacity for the International Fox Feeds, Ltd., and gave Mr. Hancock some valuable information on the feeding of foxes. Dr. Erf laid special emphasis on certain experiments with mineral and vitamin feeds for foxes, and sprouted grains, and stated that much valuable data had been worked out on these lines regarding results obtained in the breeding and furring of foxes. Also the feeding of iodine-rich has been proven of especial benefit as regards breeding. Professor Erf is an authority on fox feeding, having acted in an advisory capacity for leading fox ranchers in Ohio and Michigan including the well known Peake ranch in Ohio, which is owned by the B. F. Goodrich Rubber Co. at Akron.

Attended Fox Show  
Mr. Hancock attended a district fox show. At Wapakoneta where over 100 live foxes were on exhibition. Dr. O'Riley and Dr. Young, Secretary and President of the American National Fox Breeders Association were the judges. One foxman came over 2,000 miles to attend

previous to her marriage, when she was the recipient of many lovely gifts.—S
