In referring to P. E. I. produce, the Maritime Merchant says:—The situation is just about as it was a fortnight ago. With the exception that a couple of vessels sold out for West India shipments, there has been nothing doing. Prices remain at the old rates: oats, 37 to 38c; potatoes, 30c; turnips, 30 to 35c per bushel.

The death is announced today of Neill McKay, aged 51, a native of Prince Edward Island, says the Vancouver World of Feb. 2nd. He has been a resident of Vancouver for about a year, and last summer worked for a time on the water works. Relatives of the deceased are expected on Saturday from Vancouver Island. Mr. McKay leaves a wife and two daughters.

On Wednesday morning Mr. James Foly met with quite a loss while attempting to cross Cascaumpque Harbor. He had his sleighs loaded with mud, his head team crossed with safety, but the ice cracked when the second team went on to it. Mr. Foly tried to turn back but was too late, the sled being heavily loaded broke through the ice taking horse with it. Mr. Foly escaped with safety.

A DESPATCH to the Toronto World of the 11th says: The Dominion Coal Company beat the record last month by producing 100,000 tons of coal, a marvelous output for January. Mr. B. F. Pearson told the World to-day that the demand from the St. Lawrence this season will be a million tons, while the Maritime Provinces will take half a million tons. Some 850,000 tons will go to the United States and out of this 600,000 will go to Everett, Mass. In September next the Sydney Steel Works will begin taking coal at the rate of a round million tons a year, so it is estimated that the total output for 1901 will not be less than 3,500,000 tons. This will tax the productive power of the Dominion Coal Company to its limit and Mr. Whitney stated in Boston yesterday that he looked with pleasure upon the success of any rival company.
