FRIDAY. The rain of the early morning yesterday kept many at home who might otherwise have attended the exhibition, nevertheless in the clear weather of the late forenoon and in the afternoon a gathering of about 3000 attended the exhibition and the races.

The judging was completed yesterday afternoon. The exhibition this year has proven a successful one and, considering the ever threatening state of the weather which had much to do with the gate receipts, a satisfactory one to the directors.

The management was fully up to the high standing of former years, fully capable judges and officials performing their duties in a manner gratifying to the management, the exhibitors and the visitors. To Mr. Smallwood, the energetic secretary, due, for on their shoulders fell the lion's share of the work.

Their courteous treatment of all who had business to transact was marked while the performance of their duties was satisfactory to all concerned.

Today the exhibits will be removed and the 1911 Provincial Fair will close. The beneficial effect will be felt alike among exhibitors and visitors, the former by competition with the products of others and the latter by observation, gaining much of educational value.

The exhibitors have also felt the beneficial effects of the Provincial fair. Bruce Stewart & Co. Ltd., with their excellent display of Ideal and Imperial gasoline engines, had an exhibit which was at once pleasing to the hundreds of interested visitors and gratifying to the exhibitors. They have had very many expressions of approval of their showing of Ideal stationary engines—one of the main features of their exhibits. Interest will be divided among many exhibits from this school but perhaps most attention will be compelled to the articles in the Manual Training section in which some commendable work is shown. There is a display of vegetables that could not be beaten, and the flower exhibit is worthy of all praise. The work of the Kindergarten department shows unusual care and thoroughness in the part of the younger pupils, while the fact that serious study is not neglected is evidenced by the map drawing and other work by the advanced classes. Although this exhibit impresses one with the belief

that the McDonald Consolidated School is a strong factor in the sensible education of the young people of this Province.
