THE EXHIBITION ASSOCIATION HAVE A MOST SUCCESSFUL YEAR

The Annual Meeting Held Last Night—The Address of the President F. L. Haszard, K. C.—Recommendations for the Coming Year—Testimony of Esteem to the Retiring Director, C. C. Gardiner.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association was held in the Board of Trade rooms, McEachern Building, last night.

After the adoption of the minutes of the last annual meeting the President submitted the report of the Directors for the past year. It was as follows:

The Directors in submitting their annual report wish to congratulate the Shareholders upon the success of the second Inter-Provincial Exhibition held on their grounds last autumn. The Exhibition itself was not only one of the best, if not the best, yet held in this Province, but the marked interest taken in it by our own people from all parts of the Province and by visitors and exhibitors from the other Maritime Provinces was most gratifying.

Our thanks are due to the judges for their very valuable services and to E. W. Hodeson, the Dominion Live Stock Commissioner for his interest in enabling us to obtain the services of such competent men. The aid rendered by him in procuring them enabled your Board to have the services much less than has been paid in previous years.

The attendance at both Exhibition and races was large and resulted in a success far beyond anything the Directors could have anticipated. Deducting the prize money and all expenses connected with the races and amusements provided, the receipts from that source, namely from the sale of tickets for the admission to the race grounds and grand stands—as distinct

ST. JOHN, Jan. 29. (Special.)—William Thompson & Co., received a cable from Liverpool that five of the crew of the bark Veronica are undergoing examination on a charge of murdering Capt. A. Shaw and Mate A. McLeod and setting fire to the vessel. Shaw and McLeod were Nova Scotians.

Your Board have this year to regret the loss of one of their members, P. Blake, who has left this Province and who for so many years was a most active and esteemed Director. His experience and the value of his services particularly in the live stock department cannot well be over estimated.

COLONIALS WERE DINED IN LONDON

Our Footballists Guests of the C. M. R.

SPEECH BY G. W. FARRELL

Lord Strathcona Gives an Eloquent Address on the Imperial Spirit of the Colonies.

LONDON, January 27.—Lord Strathcona was the guest of Major R. G. Edwards Leckie and officer of the Canadian Mounted Rifles at a dinner at the Cafe Royal last night, and received an enthusiastic welcome. He said that dreadful though the war in South Africa had been, it had demonstrated that England's children looked on themselves as Englishmen in the best sense of the word, regarding the dignity and interests of the empire as in their keeping. There would always be mistakes, if England has made great mistakes from which Canada suffered, that was due to ignorance, not to a desire to do Canada injury. Like in Canada, as in other colonies, no government could resist the appeal on the part of the whole people to maintain the empire. Happily for England Canada would be able to produce every pound of wheat needed to keep this country from starvation in time of war. He hoped soon to see the Atlantic passage reduced by the Anglo-Canadian service to four days.

The Canadian footballers were present. Gerald W. Farrell, speaking on their behalf, said that they had come to England more or less as a pioneer team to learn the game. They were getting their own back a little now, and regarded it as a good omen that they had won the first match they played in the capital of the empire.

The papers to-day congratulate the Canadian football team on their win yesterday. The Daily Express says they play the game for all they are worth. They are all round triers, and with a little more combination would be truly formidable.

The Daily Mail says they possess pace and weight. The features of their game are keen tackling and the remarkable length and accuracy of their kicking. The paper adds: "Their passing yesterday was effective eliciting hearty applause." All the papers speak highly of the magnificent play of Darling. Speaking at dinner after the match, Lindsay, an old Oxford captain said, "Canada was doing grandly in the field of sports, McLeod said they were enjoying their four furlongs. They had seen Rowland Hill, who held out the hope that an English team will soon visit Canada."

Toronto, January 27.—The Telegram's cable says: "A World football team will visit Canada next season."
