"Possibly the game is as popular in these days as in the past but it doesn't seem to me," says a feminine observer who has not heard the cry for several years. Egg dyeing is still more or less popular and has been made far easier than it was in the old days—wonderful transfer patterns and vari-colored dyes being available.

SAYS SALT BEDS 200 FEET THICK

WINDSOR, Ont., April 24—(C.P.)—Rich deposits of salt, 1500 feet under the street level in the border cities were described by Norman Hobson at a meeting of a service club here recently.

Mr. Hobson said the product of the local deposits, after separation into its component elements, sodium chloride, is used in numerous ways in the protection of health and in commerce and industry.
"We have here in the border cities a gift of nature that originates in prehistoric ages," said Mr. Hobson. "The development of the product reached further and is actually of as much, if not greater interest to humanity than other much-heralded modern developments."
Exhibiting a glass-like block of the natural salt obtained from the Detroit Rock Salt Company, which has 22 miles of railway underground, Mr. Hobson explained the accepted origin of the salt deposits.
This section of the country at one time was an arm of the ocean eventually cut off from the main ocean by a process of evaporation. When the water left off the salt deposits remained. He said the main bed was 200 feet thick.
