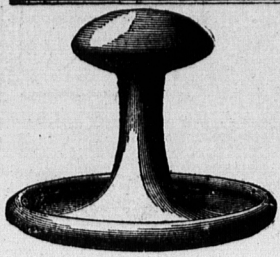

The death occurred recently at Clinton of Matthew White at the early age of eighteen years and ten months. Deceased had been in his usual health until with two days of his death. He was stricken with inflammation of the bowels and despite medical aid he passed away. He was a general favorite with old and young. He was the only son of his widowed mother, who, with his three sisters are left to mourn. His funeral was very largely attended and testified to the esteem in which the young man was held. The pall-bearers were Harold McLeod, David O'Connor, Eugene Sheen, John B. Sullivan, Albert Sheen, Robert Glover.

David Younker of Winsloe North passed peacefully away Dec 22nd after a short illness which he bore patiently. He was in the 77th year of his age. He was born at Milton from whence he removed to Winsloe where he resided until his death. He was post master for over 31 years and held office until his death. He was a good neighbor, a kind father and highly esteemed by all who knew him. He leaves to survive him an aged widow and five sons and three daughters, of whom William, Joseph, Oliver, Mrs. J. Ford, Mrs. H. F. R. reside at Winsloe; George at East Royalty; John in Illinois; Mrs. P. Chasler, North Milton. Also twenty four grand children, and three great grand children. His remains were laid to rest at Milton cemetery, Com.

The following interesting facts have been discovered in the last Government Report on the Fisheries of Canada: The eastern sea coast of the Maritime Provinces from the Bay of Fundy to the Straits of Belleisle covers a distance of 5,000 miles, which is more than double that of Great Britain and Ireland while salt water inshore area covers more than 1,500 square miles. These figures, of course do not include the area of the lakes in Manitoba and other parts of the west. The total expenditure on account of the various services in connection with the fisheries of the Dominion for the fiscal period ending last March was over \$800,000. During the season of 1906 the Deep sea fishermen of the Maritime Provinces received over \$150,000 in bounties on their catches; of this sum Nova Scotia received nearly double the total amount received by Quebec, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island put together; since the inception of the bounty system in 1882 nearly \$4,000,000 has been paid by the Dominion to the fishermen of these four provinces to aid them in developing their fisheries; in New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Quebec the value of the catches in 1906 was greater than in 1905, the banner year in the history of Canadian fisheries, the value of the salmon catch in 1906 was over \$5,800,000, of the cod catch \$3,471,193 of the lobster catch \$3,422,927, of the herring \$2,704,593, of mackerel \$1,389,728, while among the other fish even the despised eels that were caught were worth over \$125,000. During the season the value of the bait alone was over half a million and the fur seal skins secured by British Columbia hunters were worth \$316,224. There are many other points that might be culled from the report, but enough have been given to show that after all a government report is as dry as dust.
