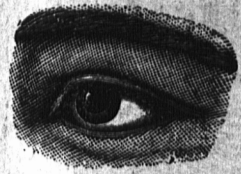

The Northumberland arrived from Pictou at 10.30 yesterday. She brought 16 carloads of freight among which were three cars of flour, one car tin, one car beans, one car oil, one car lime and a lot of general merchandise.

The schooner Joseph McGill, bound from Sydney with coal for Chatham put into this harbor yesterday, to escape the accumulating drift ice in the strait north of here. Another schooner the Jessen, of Lunenburg, also came in and anchored in the river.

Many friends will regret to learn of the death of James Murphy of this city, after a long and painful illness, which he bore with patience. He leaves to mourn a sorrowing mother, a wife and four children besides three brothers and three sisters and numerous friends and acquaintances.

The field of wheat sown by Hon. James H. Cumiskey, on Thursday is not the first recorded this spring. The performance of the Commissioner of Public Works was anticipated by Roger Farquharson, Mt. Herbert, who sowed wheat on Wednesday and thus is one day ahead.

The results of the examinations in the work of the first year at the Ontario Agriculture College have been received. First on the list is G. LeLievre of Murray Harbor South. This is a high honor as there were over sixty persons taking the examination, coming from all parts of the world.

The S.S. City of London had about 100 passengers down from East River yesterday and a large cargo of freight. Comprising 700 bush potatoes, 50 bush quahogs, 25 bags of produce, 10 cases of eggs, 2 milk cows and one sheep. She will go to West River ports today and to Vernon River Bridge on Monday morning at six o'clock.

The death occurred at Mount Stewart yesterday morning, after a two months illness, of Miss Susan Coffin, aged 60. She was a daughter of the late Elisha Coffin, formerly of Mount Stewart and a sister of Mrs. George Gude; Charlotte town, William Coffin, East Point, James Coffin Mount Stewart, and a half sister of Joseph Gahan, merchant, Rusico. The funeral takes place Sunday at 2 p. m.

Last night Captain Lister completed the inspection of the members of the Militia who have been attending the School of Signalling at the Drill Shed for some time past. About sixty men attended the classes and fifty-four of those took the examination. Captain Lister is understood to express himself as highly pleased with the men and remarked that he class here was the best he had ever had anything to do with. That they will make good marks is almost beyond question.

The death occurred yesterday of Jane McGregor, widow of the late John Farquharson in her 84th year. She was a well known resident of Mt. Herbert and lived with her son Sampson Farquharson. She had only been ill since last Sabbath, of paralysis. She leaves to mourn one son Sampson, and one daughter, Mrs. Susan Scott, Cornwall, the only survivors of a family of seven. She has been a strong and consistent adherent of the Christian Baptist Church and many friends will feel her loss.

There was a rather larger attendance at the Arena last night to witness the second game of basket ball between the Pictou Giants and the Abegweit of the City and the program of athletic event arranged by the Y. M. C. A. The entertainment was fully as interesting as that of the evening before, already described in The Guardian, and the added numbers present last night went away pleased for having attended. It will be only a matter of introducing these fine athletic exhibitions to the public to make them the most popular spring events in the calendar. The competitors were decided as follows:—

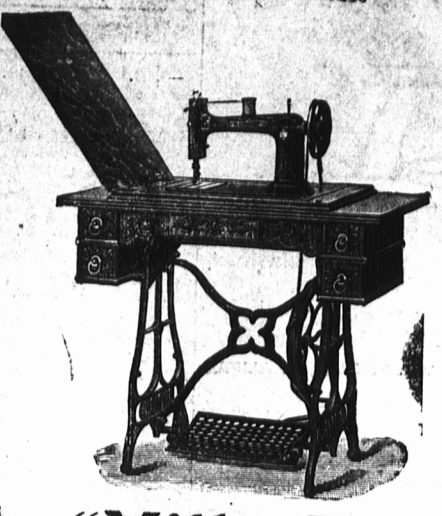
