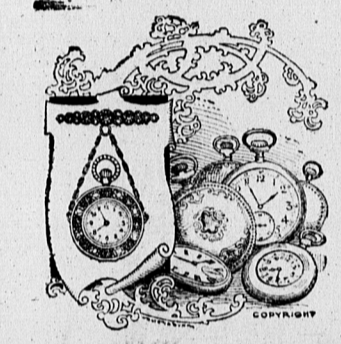

Daniel Cook, Truro, preached his first sermon and celebrated the first marriage in Stewiacke. These early settlers were a noble stock and contributed much to the moral and spiritual welfare of the beautiful valley.

The remains of the late Mrs. Peter J. McKinnon, who died at her home, 14 Sterling Sunday, were sent by the S. & L. express to Sydney last evening, to be conveyed by this morning's L. C. R. express to her old home at St. Peter's Bay, P.E.I., for interment. The body was accompanied by the only son of the deceased, J. J. McKinnon, and her daughter Mary. The late Mrs. McKinnon was 59 years of age, and had been failing for some months from cancer of the stomach which caused her death. THE INSURANCE OF STANDING TIMBER. Some few years ago it would have been considered impossible to insure large timber areas against fire with- out incurring such heavy fixed charges as would have seriously handicapped their operation. But recent- ly when big lumber men on this side of the Atlantic have found it neces- sary to appeal to the Old Country sides of the Saguenay and St. Lawrence capital to develop their resources, the question of fire insurance has come into great prominence.
