CHANGES IN RAILWAY TRAIN SERVICE

MONCTON, N. B., May 18.—Changes in Prince Edward Island train services are announced by the Canadian National Railways effective Sunday, May 27th next.

Mainland. Prominent among the changes is the resumption of the double train service to and from the mainland daily except Sunday. The afternoon connection will be by Train No. 41 leaving Charlottetown at 2:30 p.m., arriving Sackville 8:25 p.m., where connection will be made with the Maritime Express for Moncton and points west.

Summerside-Tignish. Train No. 53 will arrive Tignish 9:50 p.m. instead of 10:00 p.m., departure time from Charlottetown remaining the same as at present, viz. 3:30 p.m. In the opposite direction Train No. 54 will leave Tignish at 4:00 a.m. instead of 7:00 a.m., arrive Summerside 7:15 a.m., leave 7:45 a.m., and arrive Charlottetown 10:45 a.m.

Further Details Of Prominent Islander's Death

The following additional details of the death of Mr. J. T. Sencaubaugh, are from a Cleveland, Ohio, exchange of May 7.

John J. Sencaubaugh, 95, the oldest oil man in the world, oldest employee of the Standard Oil Co. of Ohio, and early Cleveland associate of John D. Rockefeller, Sr., died last night at his home, 1150 Euclid Avenue, as the result of a slight fall yesterday noon.

His son-in-law, W. F. Dorn, said Mr. Sencaubaugh tripped and fell when leaving the bath room of his home and seemed to improve in the afternoon but died suddenly at 7 p.m.

Mr. Sencaubaugh was born at Murray Harbor, Prince Edward Island, on Dec. 10, 1838, nine years before the first steam railroad entered Cleveland. He came to Cleveland as a young man and went into the oil trade. He was already in the business when the senior Rockefeller, who is a few months younger, was rolling oil barrels.

The company for which Mr. Sencaubaugh worked was bought out by Rockefeller. He went to another concern. When this, too, was bought out by Rockefeller, he decided Rockefeller was the man to work for.

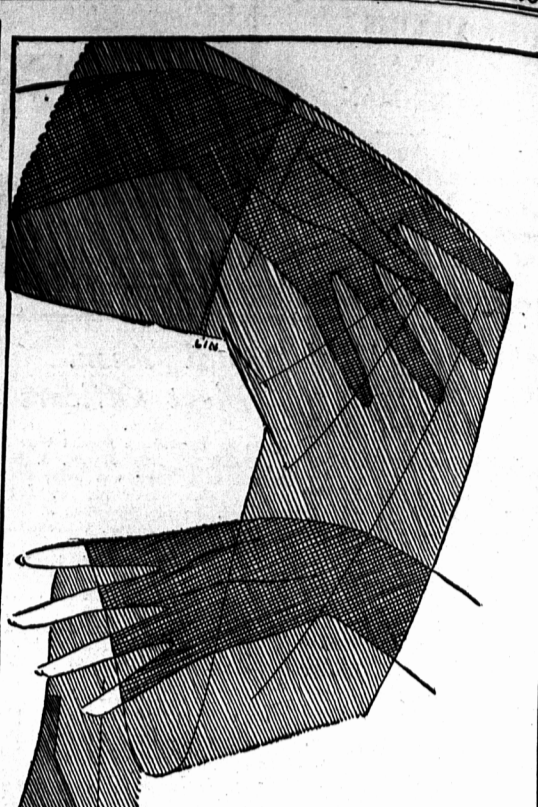
61 Years in Oil Business. He spent almost 61 years as an employee of Standard Oil, retiring on his 63rd birthday from his post as claim adjuster.

He was well known to Rockefeller and occasionally received word from him. On his 91st birthday, Rockefeller sent Mr. Sencaubaugh two of the famous dimes and a friendly letter.

Both Mr. Sencaubaugh and Rockefeller enjoyed sound health as nonagenarians. Mr. Sencaubaugh's work until his retirement, kept him outdoors, riding street cars as much as 25 miles a day in all sorts of weather. Both men, too, were deeply interested in religion.

Mr. Sencaubaugh as a young man was a Presbyterian minister, and in the '70s preached at Mayflower Presbyterian Church, at Woodland Ave., E. and E. 3rd Street. Until late in 1933 he continued to teach at a large Sunday School class at Woodland Hills Union Church. He was an ardent admirer of Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, the Detroit radio priest, and listened to Father Coughlin's weekly speeches, although his hearing made them difficult to follow.

He is survived by three daughters. They are Miss Charlotte S. Sencaubaugh, who lived with him; Mrs. Lucy E. Dorn and Mrs. Laura B. Sawyer, all of Cleveland.
