THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 24.—The export trade in Canadian grain here today was extremely dull. There was some demand from local and country buyers for flour of coarse grains but the turn-over on the whole was small and prices were unchanged. The trade in spring and winter wheat grades of flour continued of a very disappointing character but prices held steady. A feature of the market for standard grades of rolled oats was the weaker feeling that developed and prices were reduced ten cents per bag. This was attributed to the limited demand of late. Prices for all lines of mill feed were well maintained under a moderate demand. The egg trade continued inactive but prices were firm. The receipts were 1,568 cases. The market for potatoes was without any new feature to note, prices being steady with a fair trade passing. Car lots of Prince Edward Island Green Mountains were offered at \$1.20 per bag of 90 lbs.; Prince Edward Island white potatoes at \$1.15 per bag of 90 lbs.; New Brunswick Green Mountains at \$1.10 per bag of 90 lbs. in bulk; New Brunswick white potatoes at \$1.05 per bag of 90 lbs. in bulk; Quebec varieties at 95 cents to \$1. per bag of 90 lbs. in bulk, ex-track. The trade in imported beans was steady and the tone of the market was firm. Sales of odd cars of choice white handpicked were made at \$2.30 per bushel ex track, and smaller quantities at \$2.90 per bushel ex store. The cheese market was dull and featureless. The receipts were 134 boxes. Extreme dullness again marked the trade in butter but values ruled firm. The receipts were 54 packages.
OTTAWA, Jan. 24 (Eggs)—There have been some inquiries in Montreal and Toronto from the United States for store eggs but no business has been reported.
TORONTO.—There is a much better tone on the local egg market but no material change in prices. Dealers are making country shippers extras 38—41; firsts 33—36; seconds 25—26.
MONTREAL.—There has been some inquiries here from the United States for storage eggs but no business has resulted. The spot market is unchanged.

International Co., Acquire Property

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—The International Paper and Paper Company of Newfoundland, Limited, a subsidiary of the International Paper Company, today acquired the property and assets of the Newfoundland Power and Paper Company, Limited.
The properties include a 400 ton per day newsprint paper mill at Cornerbrook on the western coast of Newfoundland, a hydro-electric power plant generating 98,000 horsepower and 2,802 square miles of timber lands in Newfoundland. The controlling interest in the Newfoundland Power and Paper Company was owned by English interests.
The capitalization of the new corporation is understood to be approximately \$4,600,000; first mortgage bonds, 9,733,000 of bonds guaranteed by the British treasury; \$9,733,000 of bonds guaranteed by the Newfoundland Government; 100,000 shares of preferred stock; and 500,000 shares of common stock of no par value.

OTTAWA, Jan. 24.—The Retail Merchants Association is opposed to the proposal of the Retail Merchants Association that the Federal Parliament pass a bill to enable municipalities to tax mail order houses.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The aid of the shipping board in establishing a line of six combination passenger-cargo ships capable of crossing the Atlantic in four days, and designed as aircraft carriers for emergency war service was asked today by the American Brown Boveri Electric Corporation.
The ships would be 900 ft. long, 90 feet wide and have a displacement of 85,000 tons and a speed of 33 knots. They would accommodate 800 passenger and would have room for mail and 1,000 tons of express cargo.
