

# Detroit Red Wings Win N.H.L. Opener 3-1 From Black Hawks

DETROIT, Oct. 13 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings, with some timely scoring help from the defence, beat Chicago Black Hawks 3-1 tonight in the first National Hockey League game of the 1948-49 season.

Detroit's smallest opening game crowd since before the war—10,780 fans—saw Jack Stewart, Red Wings defenceman and Leonard (Red) Kelly score their team's first two goals and rookie centre Max McNab poke a rebound past goalie Sugar Jim Henry for the final tally.

Henry, working in the Chicago nets for the first time since traded to the Hawks earlier this week by New York Rangers, stopped 19 of the first 20 shots fired at him in the first two periods but couldn't withstand Detroit pressure in the third.

The score was tied at 1-1 on second period markers by Stewart of Detroit and Gus Bodnar of the Hawks when Kelly skated in from the boards and scored.

Ralph Natrass and J. Henry completely out of position to punch in the goal that put Detroit on top to stay.

With eight minutes of play left, McNab, a National League freshman centring Detroit's No. 1 line, backhanded in a rebound off Gor-

# Racing Digest Editor Disagrees With Jap's System

BALTIMORE, Oct. 13 (AP)—The Japanese professor can have his system of peering into horses' eyes for picking the best. A racing editor here would rather look at the race results.

"I'm an optimist, not an optician," said Edgar C. "for Genus" Horn today in commenting on a story from Tokyo. The professor, Naomusuke Hazame, said he found in eyes that glowed horizontally a sign of a good horse.

Horn, editor of Turf and Sport Digest, finds nothing new in that.

"Everybody knew that a bright-eyed horse was healthy and one with dull eyes wasn't," he says. "The same goes for the gloss of the coat. Even a bright-eyed man is better than a dull-eyed one—who probably has a hangover."

The professor also said he concluded after a study that mares are stronger for just over one mile and colts are better for longer distances. He suggested a study similar to his should be made in the United States.

Well, Horn has made just such a study. He has analyzed 11,564 starters last October and November. And this is what he found out:

Of all the colts and horses (horses are males 5 years and older) that started in races up to a mile, 12.5 per cent got into the winner's circle. For geldings (muzzed colts and horses) it was 10.8 per cent, and for fillies and mares (mares being 5 years and older), it was but 8.7.

Of all the colts and horses running at more than a mile, 12.2 per cent got into the winner's circle. For geldings it was 12.1 and fillies and mares 8.4 per cent.

Horn's conclusion from these figures are that fillies and mares of all ages are at a slight disadvantage in races up to one mile and at a distinct disadvantage at longer distances. Also that three-year-old colts and geldings can hold their own against older horses while three-year-old fillies can't.
