SOME UNITED STATES' DUTIES AND PRICES.

Under the present high tariff in the United States so little of our farm produce is exported to that country that few of our readers may have taken the trouble to acquaint themselves with the rate of customs duties or the state of the produce markets across the border. The negotiations for reciprocity, now begun, will naturally cause new interest in such matters. Our enterprising farmers, dairymen and stock-raisers will want to know what the duties now are, and what will be the chances of their re-entering the New England markets, so long closed to them, should the duties on farm products be removed, or considerably reduced. We subjoin a table of American duties on some articles in the production of which Guardian readers are more particularly interested:

Barley, 30 cts. per bushel.
Beef, mutton and pork, 2 cts. per lb.
Butter, 6 cts. per lb.
Cattle, over one year old, 27½ cent.
Cheese, 6 cts. per lb.
Eggs, 5 cts. per dozen.
Fish, smoked, dried, ½ cent. per lb.
Fruits, apples, 25 cts. per bushel.
Hams and bacon, 5 cts. per lb.
Hay, \$4 per ton.

Hides, raw or salted, 15 per cent.
Horses, \$30 per head.
Knit goods, wool, 44 cts. per lb. and 50 per cent.
Leather manufactures, 35 per cent.
Oats, 15 cts. per bushel.
Pickles, 40 per cent.
Poultry, dressed, 5 cts. per lb.
Potatoes, 25 cts.
Skins, tanned and dressed, 20 per cent.
Vegetables, 25 per cent.
Wheat, 25 cts. per bushel.
Wool, first-class, 11 cts. per lb.
Wool, second-class, 12 cts. per lb.

As will be seen at a glance, most of these duties are absolutely prohibitory. But the Boston Post, just to hand, tells that Boston would want 4,500,000 lbs. of turkey for Thanksgiving, worth 26 to 32 cents per pound. And the Post's market quotations for Saturday last included the following: Sirloin roast beef—20 to 25 cents; rump steak—25 to 30 cents; lamb, hind quarters—15 to 17 cents; pork, fresh—16 to 18 cents; fowl—18 to 20 cents; butter, fresh—38 cents; good creamery—32 to 33 cents; cheese—18 to 20 cents; henney eggs—50 to 60 cents per dozen. If the duty were off, our farmers would be getting big prices now, but city consumers doubtless think they have to pay high enough as it is.

PUBLIC OPINION AND THE NAVY.

Canada is committed to build a navy for herself, and although at the outset of the movement the leaders of both parties in Parliament were committed to the creation of a navy, there is evidently a strong body of public opinion in the country adverse to what is being done. There are still many who think that Canada does not need a navy at all. There are many others who think the better plan of assisting in both imperial and home defence by sea would have been by a money contribution to Great Britain.

Behind and intermixed with these classes are those who contend that before making so momentous a departure the Government should have consulted the people at the polls. Those of this way of thinking say that Parliament had no mandate to create a navy. This feeling is strongly asserted in Quebec Province and seems to be growing somewhat in other Provinces. Be that as it may, it can be truthfully stated that public opinion throughout Canada with regard to the navy is in a rather unsettled condition, and this fact is now more apparent than it was a year ago.

The St. John Globe, whose venerable editor, Hon. J. V. Ellis, is a member of the Senate and a Liberal of the old school, remarks upon some aspects of the situation growing out of the recent bye-election in Drummond and Arthabaska. According to The Globe, the disturbance in ministerial circles arising out of that event is more profound and serious than had been at this distance supposed. Senator Ellis, being on the spot in Ottawa and a supporter of the Administration, ought to be well-informed in regard to existing conditions. We quote:

"There is, surely, a great deal of perturbation in Government circles over the situation as regards the naval bill. The growth of opinion in favor of the idea promulgated and promoted by Mr. Bourassa has affected the feelings of many French-Canadian members of Parliament, who, while they feel it a duty to support Sir Wilfrid Laurier, are not willing to risk their seats when they know that risk means political disaster. In considering the matter, in endeavoring to weigh results, it is well to remember that the average representative will think first of himself and the safety of his seat, and that he will regard it foolishness to go down to death if he can avoid it. And this must affect the Premier himself.

"If the representatives of Lower Canada, in their effort to sustain Sir Wilfrid, will lose their seats, of what use is the effort? And what has Sir Wilfrid to gain by it, if he loses his supporters. He loses the cause, which, by some modification, he might hold. This, then, is a situation with which he must grapple. It is in the overcoming of a difficult situation that a statesman displays himself. No doubt there is a feeling in many minds that if Sir Wilfrid loses his French supporters, the country will sustain himself, but there is no evidence whatever up to this moment of any willingness of the part of the Conservatives to turn to Sir Wilfrid's support. the work of naval defence. Another fact is that so far as is apparent the Government's plan of procedure has a much larger support in the country than any other plan yet propounded. The country has gone too far to recede. And we are inclined to think, if the Government but steadfastly adheres to its policy, the insurgency in Quebec may abate as rapidly as it has arisen. Should it turn out otherwise, the louder the Nationalists shout "No Navy" the more determined will be the resolution outside of Quebec to go forward and build.

An Opposition member of the Commons has given notice of a bill to reduce the duty on agricultural implements and machines. This is only to bring the matter before Parliament. The Opposition has no power to change the tariff. Only the Government, supported by its majority can do that. But the duties must be reduced. In the most important lines of agricultural implements the Canadian duties are higher than the American. How long will our farmers consent to pay from 17½ per cent on mowing machines and binders up to 20 per cent on horse rakes, ploughs, harrows and cultivators, 25 per cent on farm wagons, and 35 per cent on hedges? Every tool of the farmer's trade is taxed while he sells his surplus products in open competition with all the world.

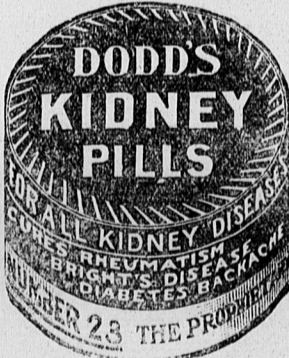

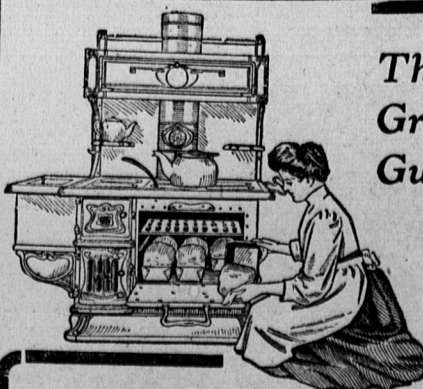
