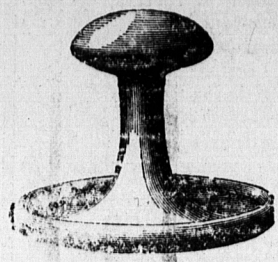

Numbers of people crossed on the river ice yesterday from points just north and east of the City limits. They reported the ice as fairly safe but with occasional dangerous places hard to discover as the thin ice was covered with a coating of snow.

Yesterday afternoon a horse attached to a sleigh kicked over the shaft and fell, while near the corner of Grafton and Great George street. A crowd quickly gathered but the horse soon regained his feet after the teamster took off the harness.

The following resolution was unanimously carried by the Commercial Cross Institute at the close of an address delivered by Artemes Moffatt on Saturday evening last. A copy of it was ordered to be forwarded to Hon. S. E. Reid, Commissioner of Agriculture: Resolved that the institute heartily approve of the action of the government in granting scholarships to farmers and farmers' sons attending the short course at the college of Agriculture, Truro, N. S., and would recommend that 40 scholarships of the same value be available for a similar purpose next year. The meeting was largely attended and everybody went home well satisfied with the address they had heard. On Wednesday a similar meeting will be held at Victoria Cross.

For depositing dead animals on the shore at Brighton a fine of ten dollars each was imposed the other day on John Byers and Edward Byers, who were also ordered by Stipendiary Macdonald to go and take the dead animals, and bury them outside the City limits in such a manner that they would not afterwards be the cause of a nuisance. The Magistrate laid stress on his remarks and very properly pointed out that he-offence is a serious one and often committed by those who are in the habit of depositing the carcasses of dead animals or other matter in places where they are likely to become a nuisance and objectionable to people living nearby. With the example thus made in the punishing of these offenders it is probable that others, who have heretofore considered they were at liberty to do as they liked in this matter, will now be very careful where they go when they undertake to bury dead animals outside of the City limits, and buried out of sight are two conditions that will have to be complied with in order to escape a fine.

Williams the Charlottetown star hockey player now on the New York Wanderers team is attracting attention of late in the press. The Crescents beat the Wanderers 3 to 2 in extra time at Brooklyn, N. Y. recently. The Brooklyn Eagle says: "The game was rough, at times 'dirty,' and throughout such a type of hockey as has gone out of fashion in local circles. It was a type of hockey that must be stopped or the game will be killed in local circles. The blame rests naturally on the referee and his assistant, who were both far too lenient. As it was, Williams of the Wanderers was ruled out three times, Johnson of the same team twice, and Dufresne of the Wanderers, Shirreff and Kennedy of the Crescents were forced to take rests for foul playing. Though Williams was the most often penalized and should have been more severely punished, it cannot be said he was the worst offender. Williams, when he devoted himself to hockey, proved that he was a forward who is the equal of the best in New York. The goal that he scored in the second half was as well earned as any that has been made in recent years.
