Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead in quarter sections of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application must be made in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 5 acres and erect a house worth \$100. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, rocky or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

MAJOR HARVIE'S DEATH AND FUNERAL

Described by the New Johannesburg Star

In a letter to Major Bartlett enclosing cuttings referring to Major Harvie's death, Mr. G. Kennedy of the Kennedy Publishing Co., Johannesburg, says:—
"I might mention that Major Harvie was a very popular officer. Shortly after coming to Africa we got acquainted especially on the rifle range. He never did much rifle shooting, but generally acted in the capacity of range officer to everyone's satisfaction.
"Everything here in Africa is about normal. The gold mines are working at full capacity, and in fact the gold output for the last year has been a record; roughly speaking somewhere in the vicinity of 35,000,000 sterling.
"The Union Government has sent about 10,000 troops to England, and they are also about to despatch 10,000 more to German East Africa. German S. W. Africa as you likely are aware is now under the control of the Union Government, and we hope and trust shall remain so for all time to come."
The following account of the death of Major Harvie is taken from the Johannesburg Star of Jan. 8:
"The announcement of the death at East London last night of Major Wendell Lathern Harvie will be received with deep regret by a very wide circle of friends and acquaintances in Johannesburg. Major Harvie had gone to East London on three months' sick leave, but succumbed to heart trouble.
Major Harvie was known to everyone who has been connected with the volunteer and defense organizations in Johannesburg for many years past and a genial disposition earned for him a host of friends. He hailed from Prince Edward Island, Canada, and came to this country during the South African War, joining the railway military staff. After the war he became a captain in the Central South African Railways Volunteers and served with the representatives of the regiment in the Zulu rebellion of 1906. In 1907 he joined the permanent staff of the Transvaal Volunteers as adjutant of the Witwatersrand Rifles, holding first the rank of Captain and afterwards that of Major. In this position as Adjutant, Major Harvie identified himself closely with the fortunes of the regiment and took the keenest interest in the musketry and other work. He had the honour of being associated with the regiment in the days of its greatest achievements in musketry competitions. To a wider sphere he extended his interest and energies, and as assistant secretary did invaluable work in promoting the success of the Transvaal military tournaments.
On the incorporation of the Transvaal Volunteers in the Active Citizen Force of the Union, Major Harvie became staff adjutant in No. 8 Military District, which embraces the Witwatersrand. From here he was transferred to Capetown and later retransferred to Johannesburg. On the outbreak of the German South-West African campaign he was staff officer for this district and to his administrative ability was due in a large measure the recruiting on the Rand for the forces for South-West Africa. But he was keen to get into the field and succeeded in securing appointment as Brigade-Major to the 3rd Infantry Brigade in South-West Africa. In this position he performed excellent service. When the brigade was split up he was appointed Assistant Inspector, Lines of Communication, a position which he held till the termination of hostilities between Germany and the Allies. He assumed the duties of Acting District Staff Officer. In recognition of his services in the campaign he was given the rank of Brevet Major. Unhappily his health had suffered severely owing to the hardships of the campaign. This handicap, notwithstanding, he took up

the responsible duties of Camp Commandant, Potchefstroom until he was relieved by Colonel Grant in November last. He returned to Johannesburg for duty, but hoping that a change to the coast would improve his health, he obtained three months' sick leave early in December and proceeded to East London, whence the news of his death has now been received.

It was only on the 17th of November 1914, that Major Harvie was married to Miss Esther Milne, who had held the post of Sister at the General Hospital, Pretoria. To Mrs. Harvie, with her infant daughter, the deepest sympathy will be extended.

THE FUNERAL

With full military honours the remains of Major W. L. Harvie were laid to rest at the New Cemetery. The cortege left Cook's establishment in Bree Street at 3.30 p. m. for the Brixton Cemetery, where the funeral service was conducted by the Rev. W. Goodwin, of the Wesleyan Church. A firing party and buglers were provided by the 4th South African Horse, which also furnished a dismounted escort of 200 men. The pall-bearers were: Colonel Macdonald, D.S.O., Lieut.-Colonel Hirsch, D.A.A.G., Pretoria; Lieut.-Colonel Grothaus, District Staff Officer, Pretoria; Lieut.-Colonel Smythe, W.R., Lieut.-Colonel Fairweather, R.L.L., Lieut.-Colonel Collins, S. S. Engineer Corps; Major McGavin Greig, Transvaal Scottish; and Captain Simkins, District Staff Officer, Johannesburg. Wreaths were sent by (among others) Brigadier-General Beves and Staff, 2nd Infantry Brigade, Colonel Taylor and Officers of the 8th Regiment; Officers, Wit. Rifles, Lieut.-Colonel and Mrs. C. B. Sauer, Colonel and Mrs. W. Dalrime, Captain and Mrs. Howarth, Officer Commanding and Officers Band Light Infantry, Officer Commanding and officers Transvaal Scottish, Lieut.-Colonel J. M. Fairweather, Brigadier-General Skinner and Staff, late 3rd Infantry Brigade, Lieut.-Colonel F. R. Collins, Officer Commanding, Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men I.L.H., Mrs. Hamilton (widow of late Major E. T. Hamilton), Captain Cross, His Loving Wife and Babe Kate, Brother and Sister-in-law, Old Commanders, Lieutenants A. H. Rishton and D. Smith, District Staff Officer No. 8 District, Mr. and Mrs. Batty and Children, District Staff Officers, No. 9 Military District, Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men 7th S.A. Infantry.

The coffin, covered by the Canadian flag and the Union Jack, was carried on a gun carriage, and was followed by the deceased officer's charger with the officer's boots reversed, and black and white tapestries. It was led by two men of the Overseas Contingent. Funeral music was played by a band composed of men of the Wit. Rifles and Railway Corps. There was a very large attendance of military and civilian mourners at the graveside, and after the funeral service the firing party fired three volleys over the grave and the buglers performed the last military rite.

THERE WILL BE LENGTHY NEGOTIATIONS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Indications in official quarters today were that Germany's reply to the request of the United States that the Tonic powers modify their announced intention to sink without warning all armed merchant ships of the enemy after February 29th, will be a statement that assurances given in the Lusitania and Arabic cases had to do only with unarmed vessels, that Germany must feel certain that its submarines which warn a merchant ship will not be attacked and that this country will be asked for its definition of defensive armament. It was considered certain that the problem of defining defensive armament would be the basis of lengthy negotiation. The first information that the United States does not accept as in accordance with the established principles of international law the latest intention of Germany and Austria, is a notification on its way to-day to all diplomatic and consular representatives abroad, to the effect that this government considers that merchant ships have a right to carry defensive armament.

In the doing of the "100" he gets his name on the books alongside that of N. H. Hargrave, of Yale, and credited as the result of a performance, September 25, 1901, when he and the others of a field were sent away from a wrong starting mark by "Sam" See, the starter. Drew's running of the last few weeks has been as convincing as the most exacting could ask, as attested by his 70 yards in 7.15 seconds, 100 yards in 10 seconds, both of which are the fastest performances on boards, to say nothing of the unofficial 10 seconds which he must have done for the "century" Friday night.
