ing of plans and policies, and for the leadership at our own Island Council meeting. Hence the program for this Annual Meeting takes the form this year of simply this executive meeting where we shall meet in consultation with the Associate Sec'y, performing the necessary routine business.

Let us keep our organization intact that when the call comes for further action we may be ready. Your president has the feeling that altho in the past much good has been accomplished through the Educational Work, and through the splendid bits of Legislation that have been successfully gathered, that we have a sense of beating the air because of the lack of before ourselves. In the nature of this Social Service work I presume that this is inevitable. If there were some more concerted effort among the various provincial organizations locally and provincially, etc., there might come to us a greater sense of the importance of the work being done.

We welcome the Associate Secretary, Rev. J. Philip Jones on his first visit to P. E. Island and difficult task in picking up the threads of the work. There are gigantic tasks of Social and Moral Reform to be attempted and furthered. There are the multitude of poor unfortunate who for their own good and society's protection, await the helping hand of a Christian people.

Our little contribution toward this larger end is not to be despised. Prince Edward Island will continue to make her gift in money. We shall do what we can to help our secretaries as from time to time they tour the Island on to the general work of the Council. Educational work. We shall continue to use our efforts toward any legitimate work which shall further the ends of moral and social uplift. In short, we shall endeavor to fill our little part of the far-flung battle line Christian forces that stand against every social evil and menace and that stand for advance in the practical tasks of the Kingdom of God.
