NEW YORK, June 6.—Lacking the turbulent last minute argument of the old days, but with interest and feeling running almost as high as it did when "Tex" Rickard was at the helm, Jack Dempsey's battle of the Maxes worked out of the training camp stage today and into the metropolis.

Schmeling, the methodical Teuton who held the heavyweight title almost two years and wants it back, took his final boxing drill at his country club camp on Lake Swannanoa, N. J. He will rest and wait through tomorrow, staying in camp until time to drive in Thursday for the weighing in ceremonies.
