## MEETING OF P. E. I. CHEESE BOARD

The regular meeting of the Prince Edward Island Cheese Board was held yesterday, many salesmen being in attendance. The following cable was posted: "Brookville, Ont., Aug. 6. Marke: dull. Offerings moderate. 1 1/2 bid. None sold on curb. White 1 1/2; colored 1 1/2." Cheese was boarded by the factories as follows: Kensington 600, Stanley 330; New Glasgow 300; Emerald 300; Hillsboro 250; Hazelbrook 120; New Perth 230; Orwell 155; North Wiltshire 315; Red Point 95; New Dominion 100; Lakeville 100; East River 62; Gowan Brae 70; Dundas 115. All the above sold to R. E. Spillet at 11 cents. The matter of cold storage was brought to the attention of the meeting by a communication from Davis & Fraser asking what support might be reckoned on from the board in the event of the firm establishing a system of cold storage in Charlottetown. The matter was finally left over till next meeting when Mr. Fraser will meet with the Board. The following resolution was passed and ordered to be forwarded to J. A. Ruddick, Commissioner of Dairying, Ottawa: "The Cheese Board of P. E. Island, in regular meeting convened, desire to convey to you their appreciation of the good work done in the interests of dairying this season by Harvey Mitchell, a member of your staff, and would strongly request of you that his services here on P. E. Island be continued through the remainder of the season, or as much of his time given as can be spared to this Province.

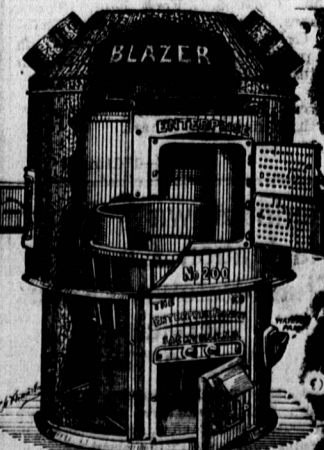
