### GEORGE D. D. MACEWEN

The passing of one of Charlottetown's best citizens in the person of George David Douglas MacEwen on January 1st, 1936, was learned with deep regret by all who knew him, but more especially by his intimate acquaintances. "Doug" as he was familiarly known by his railway associates was a man of sterling worth, kind, friendly and generous. His railway career of 38 years was an enviable one; through all those years of service he never had one demerit mark.

Mr. MacEwen was born at Bristol, Lot 46 in the year 1866 the eldest son of Henry and Sarah Douglas MacEwen; he was married to Margaret Coffin in the year 1894 who predeceased him by exactly one year. Also his oldest daughter Mrs. J. L. Younker and his son Harry passed on before him. Those surviving to mourn his loss are Mrs. J. C. Wood, Sunbury; Nelson, Secretary Y. M. C. A., Montreal; Reia, Mrs. L. H. D. Howatt, City; also eleven grandchildren. He is also survived by one brother Hammond, Bristol, Lot 40.

Mr. MacEwen was a member of St. John's Lodge No. 1 A. F. & A. M., a member of St. Lawrence Lodge No. 8 I. O. O. F. and a member of the Independent Order of Foresters. In religion he was a member of the Presbyterian Church going with it into the Union. He was a faithful member of Trinity United Church of this city.

The funeral was largely attended, the officiating clergymen were Dr. E. H. Ramsay and Rev. C. N. Brown, M. A. The pallbearers were Messrs Arthur MacKay, John Munroe, Alfred Affleck, Fred Houle, J. J. MacKinnon, and W. O. Davey. The service at the grave was conducted by the Order of Masons and of Odd-fellows.

Mrs. McLeod then took charge of the meeting and stated that besides remembering their founder, Frances Willard, they should pay tribute to two of their most honored members, who had recently gone to their eternal reward, the late Mrs. A. M. Wright, who was one of the first chartered members of the W. C. T. U. in Summerside, and Miss Libbie Clark, who was also one of the oldest and most consistent members of the Union. Mrs. C. D. McCallum then read an extract from a sermon written by Dr. Smith, a former minister of the Presbyterian Church, Summerside, on the bright side of death. Mrs. Jack McLeod beautifully rendered an appropriate solo, she was accompanied by Mrs. John Smallman. Mrs. Neil McLeod then gave a very interesting sketch on the life of Frances Willard's mother. Before her marriage her name was Frances Thompson Hill. She was a woman of very beautiful character and was a great inspiration to her daughter, Frances Willard. Her home was in Vermont but she afterwards went west in a covered wagon and with her husband and children made a home in the virgin forest of Wisconsin. Rest Cottage in Evanston is the headquarters of the W. C. T. U. and was the childhood home of Frances Willard. Lady Henry Somerset once paid a very high tribute to Madame Willard and classed her as one of the greatest and noblest of women. Frances Willard called her mother St. Courageous. A vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. McLeod for her interesting talk and also to Mrs. McCallum and Mrs. Jack McLeod for their contribution to the programme. E.
