DATES OF CAMP SUSSEX

ST. JOHN, March 15—Divisional Order No. 85, by Colonel Humphrey, A. A. G., Sixth Division, dated Halifax (N. S.), March 11, 1913, fixes the date of Camp Sussex as 24th June to 5th July, 1913. The following units will comprise the camp:

Calvary—8th Hussars and 28th N. B. Dragoons.

Artillery—10th, 12th and 19th Field Batteries of the 4th Brigade, C. P. A.

Engineers—1st Field Company, C. P. A., as required.

Infantry—16th Infantry Brigade, 67th Regt., 71st Regt., 73rd Regt., 74th Regt.

Signalling Corps—No. 8 section. C. A. S. C.—No. 7 Co. C. A. M. C.—No. 2 General Hospital.

Canadian Postal Corps—No. 6 detachment.

Details of C. P. A. S. C., P. A. M. C., C. O. C., and C. A. P. C., as required.

City Corps—62nd Regt., 27th June to 2nd July.

In addition to the above there will be the Headquarters Staff and one Company, R. O. R.

HUMAN FLY HURLED FROM SEAT

NEW YORK, March 13—A steel rocket containing Rodman Law, the "human fly," in which he intended to be shot 3,500 feet in the air, descending by a parachute, exploded this afternoon when 800 pounds of powder hurled 25 feet from his seat in the rocket but was unharmed.

Protected by padding and a helmet, Law crawled into the rocket with his parachute and gave the order to fire. The fuse lighted and spluttered for thirty seconds. There was a burst of flame, a cloud of smoke and a terrific report. Hundreds of spectators straining their eyes for a sight of the great rocket, hurling thru the air, saw it leap forward a few feet and burst into

fragments. Law was hurled violently thru the air and to the ground. His hair and eyebrows were burned off. For perhaps ten seconds he was unconscious. Then he got up and looked around.

"Damn that thing," he exclaimed, "I thought I was going up."

Panic spread among the spectators immediately after the explosion. It seemed inconceivable that Law could have escaped being blown to bits, and several women became hysterical.

NEW RECORD IN LUMBER SHIPMENT

MIDDLETON, March 14—Captain Walter Purdy, of Deep Brook, has been appointed fishery overseer for Annapolis county, in succession to the late W. M. Bailey.

Last week the Davison Lumber company made a new record at Springfield, by moving three and a quarter million feet of logs. In the past six weeks eighteen millions have been moved.
