SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Oct. 18—That President Taft's special train actually passed over Elcapitan 800 foot bridge yesterday morning, while twenty-one sticks of dynamite were in place ready to be exploded, was the opinion expressed by George Winge, employed by the Southern Pacific to investigate the alleged attempt at bridge dynamiting.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 16—A report received here today by officials of the Southern Pacific Railway Company from C. B. Brown, section foreman for the road at Naples, Cal., described the discovery of 36 sticks of dynamite under the Cairtan viaduct, 20 miles north of Santa Barbara, several hours before President Taft's special train passed over the bridge en route to Los Angeles this morning.

The dynamite was found after the watchman engaged in a revolver battle with two men who escaped.

The dynamite was discovered at 2 o'clock this morning. The President's train passed over the bridge at 5.51.

The night watchman saw two men on the bridge shortly before 2 o'clock.

They were at the opposite end of the 1000-foot span and ran when ordered to halt.

The watchman hurried across the bridge, firing several shots as he did so, and they returned.

After the pair had escaped in the darkness the watchman returned to the bridge and began an investigation.

Near the centre of the span lodged on one of the supports of the viaduct, he found the dynamite, with a 10-foot fuse attached to one of the sticks.

He left the field untouched and went immediately to Santa Barbara notified the officials.

Sheriff Wines of Santa Barbara county proceeded at once to the bridge with several deputies and removed the dynamite.

A general search is being made for the men. SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Oct. 17—E. E. Calvin, Vice-President and General Manager of the Southern Pacific has offered \$5,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of the men who attempted to dynamite a bridge in front of President Taft's special yesterday.

There were thirty-six sticks of dynamite in the little heap found under the Cairtan Viaduct, twenty miles north of Santa Barbara, several hours before President Taft's special train passed over the bridge, enroute to Los Angeles, yesterday.

The dynamite was found after the watchman engaged in a revolver battle with two men who escaped.

The dynamite was discovered at 2 o'clock in the morning. The President's train passed over the bridge at 5.54 a. m.

MELBOURNE, Australia, October 17—Richard Arnst, of New Zealand, the world's champion sculler, who is visiting here, started to-day that he had called "Eddie" Durran, the Canadian sculler under certain conditions, to row at Toronto.

If a favorable reply was received, Arnst said that he would go to Toronto.

PANKOW, China, Oct. 18—A general engagement between the revolutionary army and the Imperial forces was precipitated on the water front today by an attempt of Admiral Sah Chen Ping to land a large body of troops for the reinforcement of Gen Cheng Piao.

Scattered bodies of revolutionists on both sides of the river joined in the fighting and by mid-afternoon it was estimated that 2,000 Imperial troops and nearly 10,000 rebels were engaged.

PRKING, October, 17—Acting U. S. consul at Nanking telegraphed the American legation here today that the fall of Nanking was imminent.

He says that a gunboat should be sent there.

PAO TING FU, Oct. 17—Kai Fung, the capital of Ho Nan province, is reported to have fallen before the revolutionists.
