Sackville 5:15 p. m. arriving Charlottetown 8:50 p. m. leaving Charlottetown for Summerside at 12:01 p. m. daily except Sunday is cancelled.

OTTAWA, May 24—(CP)—Prime Minister MacKenzie King told the House of Commons today he would announce "within a few days" what additional legislative program would be presented by the Government at the present session.

Third Reading Of FCA Act Delayed

OTTAWA, May 23—(CP)—The Senate tonight put over until Wednesday third reading of the Government's bill amending the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act. Considerable opposition to the measure has developed among the Senators from Prince Edward Island.

Hon. Cressman MacArthur (Lab. Prince) tonight reiterated his objections. He insisted on delaying third reading. "This bill," he said, "can't go through as it is."

"On Wednesday," retorted government leader Dandurand, "I shall take charge of the bill."
