WINNIPEG HONORS THE OLD FLAG.

The flag that for a thousand years has braved the battle and the breeze will never want defenders in Canada, if needs be, but is sometimes granted a scant tolerance in the land of the free across the border.

Our cousins to the south, who are ever ready to fly their own flag in Canada on every possible occasion, and are cheerfully permitted to do so, are very reluctant to permit British subjects to fly the Union Jack within the bounds of the Republic. This is quite inexplicable, but the fact is so patent that in recent years in some parts of Canada it has aroused strong feeling.

Here in Charlottetown we have, fortunately had no disagreeable "flag incidents" such as have occurred sometimes in Western Canada and in broader states. There is here a seemingly proper disposition to treat all national flags with respect and to be even too tolerant when our own flag is relegated to the back ground or altogether absent while foreign national emblems are rather too ostentatiously paraded, as is sometimes the case during the tourist season or on some United States anniversary.

We are glad to find, however, that in the West, among the mixed populations that are now flowing in, a loyal disposition is shown by those in authority to honor the flag of our country and keep for it such precedence and prominence as it is entitled to. Manitoba flings the British flag to the breeze from all her school-houses, and Winnipeg, the Metropolis of the West has adopted two by-laws on the subject of our own and foreign flags which show a proper spirit, and the example seems likely to be followed in other Provinces and cities of Canada.

Winnipeg's two flag by-laws read as follows:

"In every procession or parade in which the applicant for any such license shall display any national flag or flags, the said applicant shall display the British National Flag, unfurled, of not less than 4 1/2 x 9 feet in size at the head of such procession or parade. If any flags of other nations are displayed in such procession or parade, the same shall be unfurled behind the British Na-

tional Flag; and for every flag of any other nation so unfurled or displayed there shall be unfurled or displayed at least two British national flags of the same size and dimensions. The due observance of the provisions of this section shall be a condition to the granting of a license under sub-section 26 of section 11 of this by-law, and upon a breach thereof, the city may recover the amount of the bond or retain the cash deposit to be furnished by such applicant in terms of section 34 of this by-law.

"No procession shall parade in the streets of the city of Winnipeg in which national flags are displayed without having at the head of the said procession the British National Flag, unfurled and flowing, and, wherever the said procession has any flags other than the British flag displayed, there shall be displayed the British flag as the proper emblem, in a position above and in precedence to all other flags.

"No procession shall parade the streets of Winnipeg without first giving three days' notice thereof to the chief of police, who shall, upon receipt of such notice, receive from the persons in charge of said procession, an understanding that the British flag shall be the most prominent and most conspicuous flag in such processions, in case it is proposed that any other national flags shall be displayed in such processions."

The Manitoba Government and the Winnipeg City Council are to be congratulated on the stand they have taken in this matter. Proper respect for the flag of the Empire should be insisted on throughout Canada, and proper respect demands that a British flag shall always appear and be given the place of honor and precedence on any occasion at which the flags of other nations are displayed on Canadian soil. The like rule obtains in all civilized countries and should be enforced here. No one can reasonably object to such a rule. It is a sound principle that in every country, and the emblem of its sovereignty is entitled to the first place in honor and precedence.

PROHIBITION VERSUS LICENSE.

Two cities, Fargo, N. D., and Moorehead, Minn., are not quite a mile apart. Each is about the size of Charlottetown. Fargo with no saloons for ten years, has a tax rate of 15.98 mills and one mile of street pavement for every 676 population. Moorehead, with 46 saloons, has a tax rate of 21.80 mills and only one mile of street pavement for every 3,862 population. This shows how closely related are sobriety and civic improvements. When citizens begin to "take heed to their steps" from a moral point of view they feel the need of good sidewalks. And no license town in the Maritime Provinces has such fine sidewalks as Charlottetown, or so good a water supply, or so low a tax rate.

There is nothing so expensive to a city as the licensed saloon. In the first place it depreciates the value, not only of the building occupied for saloon purposes, but all adjoining properties. Who would live next door to a saloon? The saloon impoverishes its patrons, makes them idle and unthrifty, injures general trade by taking the money which would otherwise be spent in dry-goods, groceries, hardware, boots and shoes and other useful articles, and giving no value in return.

Prohibition, on the contrary promotes trade, industry, thrift, health, order, peace and prosperity. And with these come the desire for civic improvement. Our prohibitory law is the best asset of Charlottetown, as is shown in many ways. What was before a stagnant city has become prosperous, greatly improved in every way and progressive. Civic pride and self-respect have been

greatly enhanced. Where one citizen was proud of the city ten years ago there are ten today who are proud of Charlottetown. The betterment cannot be measured in mere dollars, and yet they are worth hundreds of thousands.

The Toronto Globe is showing great activity and enterprise these days in collecting information upon timely topics of interest to all Canada. Its managing editor Dr J. A. 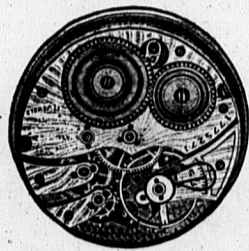
