Judge Dictionary Settles Disputes

New Words Are Defined in Work Offered Readers of This Paper

In case of doubt concerning the meaning of a word, the dictionary is the court of appeal to which the average individual must resort.

When Dr. Johnson compiled his celebrated dictionary, offered to the public in 1755, it represented a movement initiated by Swift, Addison, Pope and other noted English writers of that period to compose a dictionary that would fix forever and unalterably the English language in one perfect form.

But the lapse of years has demonstrated that fashions in words change with the times and that a dictionary to be authoritative and accurate must be up to date.

A popular demand for such a work has been answered by the work which has been undertaken by the editors of The New Universities Dictionary in which thousands of words not found in any other dictionary are fully defined.

Many of these words have been brought into general and proper use by the great strides made in science, business, religion and the various arts.

Specialized activities, such as aviation, golf, baseball and other forms of sports have also given currency to many new terms and definitions of which will be found in the new dictionary.

RADIO BROADCASTS TO MOVING TRAINS

Canadian National Railway To Add Novel Feature to Service

According to an announcement made by Mr. W. D. Robb, Vice-President of the Canadian National Railway, radio will prove an important part in the service of the National System during the coming year.

By making use of existing broadcasting stations and by the erection of others, programs of entertainment and news will be broadcasted from one end of the Dominion to the other.

Another important item will be the equipping of all transcontinental trains of the Canadian National Railway with radio receiving sets and placing them in charge of skilled operators.

News items and concerts may be broadcast to trains en route across Canada. Very successful experiments along this line were carried out during the past summer by the National System, when all special trains were equipped with radio receiving sets and concerts and news picked up by them while the train was travelling.

A radio receiving set installed in the car used by Mr. Lloyd George was the means of bringing to him world wide news of the greatest importance and of causing him to characterize as "invaluable" this special feature of the Canadian National service.

The official announcement of Mr. Robb, is as follows:

Realizing the intense interest in radio receiving in Canada there now being over 100,000 radio users, it may not be amiss for me to state briefly the radio plans now in process of fulfillment on the part of the Canadian National Railway.

We have now under erection a very powerful broadcasting station in Ottawa, located on the roof of the Jackson building--this station will be tied in with the Northern Electric Station at Montreal so that our programmes from either Ottawa or Montreal will be broadcasted simultaneously from the two points and should be received by practically the entire Eastern end of Canada and the United States.
