Notes From Boston

We are enjoying very pleasant weather here, but there is a lingering touch of April in the air.

Business is not quite as good as our hopes would have it. There is quite an army of unemployed, but the situation is clearing, everyone is hopeful, with prosperous years ahead.

The last census of the United States reveals a population of 115,000,000, of which about two million were born in Canada, and nearly half that number find a home in New England. The American Colonies had scarcely more than Canada's quota in the days of the Revolution.

The shower of deserving notices that came to Mr. J. E. B. McCready, on his last birthday, must be an inspiration to give even greater service in his chosen field. Such a long and eventful life, covering nearly two generations, depicting the rise and fall of Governments, the issues which meant defeat or victory, and an intimacy with National leaders conferred as a tribute to the power of the Press, Mr. McCready must have an impressive past, stretching down to the days of Confederacy. When marching armies rocked the world, leaving desolation, chaos and misery in its wake, Mr. McCready's activities can be best reflected in those lines:

"How shall I speak thee, or thy power address, 'Thou God of our idolatry, the Press?"

By thee, religion, liberty and laws, Exert their influence, and advance their cause."

The Centenary exercises commemorating the birth of Thomas D'Arcy McGee, stirred the recollection of many old admirers here who remembered him as the guiding spirit of the Boston Pilot. Like John Boyle O'Reilly, who succeeded him as Editor, he brought a charm, a dignity, and a power of expression to every cause he espoused. I can recall the reading of his tragic end on the steps of the House of Commons, Ottawa, in the Halifax Chronicle in 1868. The exercises were given lasting value by the brilliant and impressive address of Mr. McEighen. The occasion was worthy of the effort. In the meantime, the leader of the opposition has gone to higher levels, and who can forecast when such leadership will be crowned with new responsibilities in guiding the Nation's destinies?

The election of Von Hindenberg, as President of the German Republic, offers a balm to the wounds of the powerless Royalists. Germany will remain a republic; the votes of the German people were given to the veteran warrior more to lessen the just demands of the Allies than an interpretation of a desire for a restored monarchy.

Tobacco And Alcohol Cause Failing Vision

TORONTO, May 8.—(The excessive use of Tobacco and Alcohol was cited as the second greatest cause of failing vision after middle age by Dr. J. C. Connell, Kingston, in addressing Ontario Medical Association today. The leading cause is syphilis and since 1914 he has noticed increased in this disease which formerly was quite rare.

CLAIM RUSH OF WORK CAUSE FOR WOMEN CHANGING PLAN

NEW YORK, May 7.—Formal announcement was made today by New York headquarters of the International Council of Women that plans to entertain Lady Aberdeen, who came from England to preside at the body's quinquennial convention at Washington next Monday, and other foreign delegates, had been called off.

The abrupt cancellation of the entertainment plan was made on telegraphic instructions from the National Council committee in Washington. Mrs. William Dick Sporborg, local committee chief said. Lady Aberdeen and other delegates from foreign countries who have been in Canada the past week were to have come to this city today to be the guests of New York women at a luncheon, in a ride about the city, a tea, banquet and a theatre party. Local committee headquarters said the reason given for the cancellation was "rush of work."

MRS PHILOMENA DOUCETTE

On Thursday, April 30th, the hearts of many friends and relatives were deeply saddened when it was heard that Mrs. Philomena Doucette of Little Tisbury, had been called from this earthly scene. DR. BENJAMIN CHAPPELL, MISSIONARY TO JAPAN DIES

The Rev. Benjamin Chappell, D. D., for thirty-six years a missionary of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Tokyo, Japan, died suddenly of apoplexy and cerebral hemorrhage on Sunday, (May 3rd.) at Hagl, Japan, according to a cablegram received by the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, 150 Fifth Ave., New York City.

Dr. Chappell had been on the retired list of missionaries since 1918, but up to the time of his death was actively engaged in the work of Aoyama College in Tokyo.

Dr. Chappell was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Canada, on April 3, 1852, and was a graduate of Mt. Allison College, Sackville, New Brunswick, class of 1873. He received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Mt. Allison in 1909. In 1883 he joined the Canadian Methodist Episcopal Church and was licensed to preach at the age of twenty-two. For fifteen years previous to his appointment as a missionary to Japan, he lived the life of an itinerant circuit rider travelling the pioneer circuit of the Canadian Northwest. He was pastor of the Church in Campbellton, New Brunswick, in 1889 when he decided to go to the mission field under the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

He served during this period in Shediac, New Brunswick; Carmarthen street, Queen Square and Portland Street churches, St. John, New Brunswick; Kamloops, British Columbia; Maple Bay, British Columbia; Summerside, Prince Edward Island; Campbellton, British Columbia.

Most of Mr. Chappell's years in Japan were given to educational work in Aoyama College, Philander Smith Bible Institute and the Anglo-Japanese College in Tokyo. He was dean of the latter for nine years. In addition to his school work he held the pastorate of the Union Church in Tokyo for a number of years, preaching to the English speaking peoples of the capital city. Dr. Chappell had a fine command of the Japanese language. He translated a number of important Christian volumes into that tongue.

(Mrs. Chappell, who was a missionary when she met Dr. Chappell, died in 1912. Three daughters survive.

In the neighborhood the unpretending influence of her peaceful and cheerful ways was felt by old and young. In the church her steady loyalty strengthened our membership. But especially in the home she was the light and life of the family circle. To say this is but to say what many friends felt as they watched through their tears the procession that solemnized her last departure from the home. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the sorely bereaved husband and children.

TEACHERS ALL EXPENSE TOUR TO THE PACIFIC COAST INCLUDING CANADIAN AND AMERICAN NATIONAL FARES

A complete thirty-day all-expense tour is being arranged to the North Pacific Coast, special train leaving Toronto, July 9th, travelling on this train to Prince Rupert, B. C., stopping over en route for a day at Winnipeg, Buffalo Park, three days at Jasper National Park, with short stopovers to view Mount Robson and the Indian village of Kitwanga. The party will then board Canadian National Pacific Coast Steamer for Vancouver, spending a day at Vancouver, Victoria, Portland and Seattle, returning from Portland via Union Pacific with sidetrack to Yellowstone Park, thence to Salt Lake City, Rocky Mountain Park, Denver, Chicago and back to Toronto, which point will be reached on August 7th. The tour will include four and one half days automobile in Yellowstone Park, and one and one half days tour in Rocky Mountain National Park.

The tour is being arranged under the direction of A. E. Bryson, Principal of Silverthorn School, Toronto, and Martin Kerr, Principal of the Earl Kitchener School, Hamilton. Full information may be secured from Mr. Bryson, 44 Silverthorn Avenue, Toronto, also from Mr. Kerr, 4 Duclach Avenue, Hamilton.

The rate of \$413.50 from Toronto includes transportation, lower berth accommodation on trains, hotel and bunglow camps, meals in diners, sight-seeing tours. For two persons occupying one lower berth, the cost will be \$374.45 each.

While primarily assigned for the benefit of Teachers of Ontario, the Tour is now thrown open for the whole of Eastern Canada, and to the general public.

Great Eruptions Being Recorded

VICTORIA, B. C., May 8.—Somewhere in the bowels of the earth there have been eruptions of gigantic proportions during the last few days, according to Dominion Meteorological stations here. Records show five distant quakes from Sunday to Tuesday varying in duration from one to four hours. Shocks are estimated to have taken place approximately 600 miles southwest of Victoria in the vicinity of the Philippines and probably close to Island of Guam.
