LOBSTER FISHING EXTENDED—The Inspector of Fisheries here, Mr. S. T. Gallant has received a copy of the Northern Council that reads as follows: Owing to abnormal conditions this Spring the Minister of Fisheries has been pleased to grant an extension of fifteen days to lobster fishing.

Mr. Shaw declining the nomination Mr. Jenkins was declared nominated for Councilman. The balloting for Assemblyman resulting in the nomination was on motion of Capt. McDonald seconded by Mr. Owen declared unanimously by a standing vote.
Mr. Jenkins amid applause declared his determination to support no government that did not do its full duty by the farmers. In fighting the Bell administration he believed the Conservatives were fighting the most corrupt government that has ever held the reins of power in P. E. Island, for there has never been a government that has deceived the people more. He felt sure that when the votes are counted on July 26th they will be swept out of power. (Applause.)

A NARROW ESCAPE—What might have been a more serious accident than that which was averted by the timely intervention of the North Shore on the fishing grounds of the North Lake factories, where two young fishermen with a heavy load of traps overturned their boat but were saved just in time by two fellow fishermen. The two young men are Henry DeLorie and Joseph Murphey hail from Vernon River and were engaged at shifting traps and had on a heavy load of traps when the wind blew from the North West and with their engines at high speed and their load heavy the wind quickly went under and overturned. When the fishermen saw she was going under they sprang over the stern to save themselves from coming in contact with the traps. The traps went down and the boat remained bottom up. The two boys sank beneath the surface and on coming up caught the boat and climbed upon the bottom. Dripping with water they gazed about not a boat could they see in the surrounding waters but at last sighted one on the inner shore. The grounds about two miles distant. This was their only chance and they shouted. The fishermen in this boat James Murphy of Elmira and Louis McInnis of Red Point heard the shouting and immediately started their engine and arrived on the scene just in time for had they been left but a few minutes more they would certainly have perished. They were clinging to the bottom of the boat wet and shivering with cold, and joyful when they saw the boat near them. They were taken on shore where they received dry clothing and restoratives. The two rescuers secured the aid of another boat and went for the overturned boat which they uprighted and towed to shore. The two young men are feeling none the worse of their thrilling experience but bestowed gratitude upon the two fellow-fishermen who saved them from going to unknown graves in the dark waters of the Gulf.
