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At London POLKESTONE, England—(CP)—Detonation of a magnetic mine washed ashore set off an explosion that shook the East Kent coast from Folkestone to Dungeness but there was no damage.

At Montreal MONTREAL—(CP)—Harbor officials searched records for many years but couldn't find any other instance of the port being free of ice in the first week of January as it was this year.

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N.Y. Stocks Reach New High Since U.S. Election

NEW YORK, Jan. 23—(AP)—The stock market wormed its way upward last week to the highest level since Nov. 4.

Only once during the week was the climb interrupted, and then only to a slight degree. Day-to-day gains were small but they were enough to boost the total market value of all shares listed on the exchange by around \$1,000,000,000.

News, good or bad, seemed to have little effect on prices. A large and successful new financing deal involving common stock was shrugged off with impressive calm. Repeated reports of buyers' markets in various fields, declining wholesale prices for some goods and a curtailing of industrial layoffs were politely disregarded.

Equally notable was the type of buying and the stocks affected. Higher priced issues came in for considerable attention as well as a number of top-level common shares. Many of the usually favored trading mediums, on the other hand, were more or less ignored.

Probably the week's most promising development in Wall Street was the successful sale of two big blocks of common stocks. Investment bankers' stock brokers and dealers, and others in the financial field have been singing the blues for a long time about a sour market for common and preferred shares.

The reasons they can't market new issues of common and preferred stocks, it has been claimed, is that among other reasons Federal income tax rates are too high.
