POLISH PATRIOTISM

The Polish societies of London yesterday met and decided in the case of the German invasion of England to offer a Polish legion for active service.

GERMAN GOEBEN IN DARDANELLES

Athens, Aug. 12.—It is learned from official sources today that the German battle cruiser Goeben took refuge in the Dardanelles yesterday. Her commander must coal and leave within 24 hours or agree to dismantle the ship and leave her there until the end of the war.

ITALY AND PANAMA EXPOSITION

Italy has cancelled her participation in the Panama Pacific Exposition at San Francisco in 1915 on account of the gravity of the situation.

CONSERVATIVE TO PRISONERS

Official advices received at Amsterdam say prisoners taken by German fighting around Liege are being shown every possible consideration.

RAINBOW SAFE

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—The Government was reassured this afternoon by the receipt of a message stating that the Rainbow was sighted off Vancouver Island. The cruiser Drake is reported off the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The presence of this vessel will increase the safety of British shipping on the Atlantic coast.

RUSSIAN VICTORY

LONDON, Aug. 12.—A dispatch from Paris says a correspondent learns from a reliable source that the Russians obtained an important victory over the Austrians, capturing many prisoners, and war materials. The scene of the battle was not disclosed.

OTTAWA'S GIFT

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—The City of Ottawa's gift to the Motherland will be a machine gun battery, four guns of mounted motor trucks equipped with steel shields which will require thirty-two men to operate and will cost \$100,000.

RECRUITS ENLISTED

LONDON, Aug. 12.—The war office information bureau has the following announcement: "The mobilization of the Territorial force unit to complete. Some units were accepted with liability to serve overseas and Volunteers are being asked to follow their example. Five thousand recruits have been enlisted for Kitchener's Army in the past twelve hours."

FIERCE SEA FIGHT

ST. JOHN, Aug. 12.—It is reported here from New York that a fierce sea battle is on between French, English and German Cruisers. The results are not known yet but the Allies ships are believed to be superior. It is also believed the Allies have won, although there is no confirmation secured yet. It is also understood there was one sea fight off the Nova Scotian Coast and another near Bermuda.

BRITISH EXPEDITION

PARIS, Aug. 10.—The British expedition that has landed successfully in France was planned by the conference held in London. The news that the English soldiers were going was rigidly suppressed.

It is admitted at the War Office here that the troops are only the advance guard and that England already has ships ready to run the army of 100,000 across the Channel.

The announcement that these British forces are actually on French soil has aroused the greatest enthusiasm. The British force was 22,000 in strength, and comprised some of the crack regiments of the British Army.

They were taken over in a fleet of British transports, convoyed by two battleships and three armored cruisers and were landed at Ostend, Calais and Dunkirk yesterday. Landing was expeditiously done under the direction of the French officers, who had been sent by the War Office for that purpose. These troops will be hurried by Nieuport, where they are to aid the Belgians in making their second stand when Liege proves untenable.

MARRIED VOLUNTEERS

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—Col. Hughes says that no married men will be allowed to leave for the front without the consent of their wives.

GERMANS HURRYING UP SIEGE GUNS

Heavily censored dispatches from Liege indicate that German siege guns are nearing Belgium city and that simultaneously a concentration of the German forces for a final assault on city is in progress.

FAMISHED GERMANS EAT DOG FLESH

LONDON, Aug. 12.—A despatch from Brussels states that the German soldiers at Liege are so famished they are offering as high as 25 cents per pound for dog flesh.

GERMANS RETREATING

BRUSSELS, Aug. 12.—The Belgian War Office announced this afternoon that the German forces are retreating.

SERVIANS VICTORIOUS

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, Aug. 12.—News received here from Athens says the Servians are marching into the interior of Bosnia. They are at present before the Serbian legation at Athens.

RUMOR DENIED

LONDON, Aug. 12.—It is officially denied that the Bank of England will establish branches in Canada and South Africa.

COLORED TROOPS

LONDON, Aug. 12.—France has several regiments of Turcas Colored Troops from Algiers. These men led the charge on Mulhausen astonishing all by their ferocity.

A SILENT VICTORY

LONDON, Aug. 12.—The most striking point emerging today is what is described here as "the silent victory." This applies to the fact that the North Sea, over which most absolute silence brooded so long, is now open to shipping without serious danger.

TREASURE SHIP

LONDON, Aug. 12.—A despatch from Lisbon, published in The Times says that the Hamburg-American Line Steamer Caportgal, reported captured by the British warship and taken off Oporto Portugal on Sunday night, carries 85,000,000 species. She sailed from Buenos Ayres for South America on July 16.

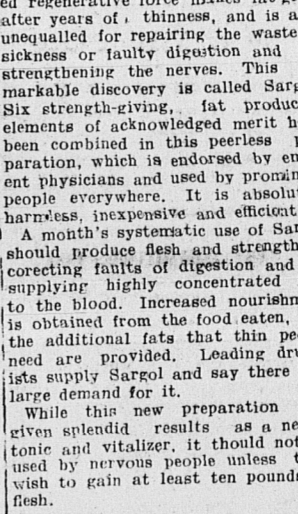
