WAR WORKERS HELP NURSES

LONDON, Oct. 21 (CP)—Women war workers in Gambia, West Africa, have decided to donate £100 (\$400) to the Medical Department to be used as a permanent memorial to their war work. The money is to be used to provide a silver medal to be presented annually to the best nurse qualifying in each year.

The medal is to be inscribed and known as "The Gambia Women War Workers Memorial Medal." A new medal will be presented each year and it will become the property of the nurse to whom it is awarded.

This is the first annual prize of its kind to be awarded to nurses training in the Gambia, and it is a fitting memorial to the work of the Women War Workers.

CANADIANS AIRMINDED

OTTAWA, Oct. 22 (CP)—Canadians are taking to the air in ever-increasing numbers.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today the number of revenue passengers carried by civil aircraft during 1945 increased to 490,809, compared with 371,397 in 1944 and 292,986 in 1943.

Revenue freight carried in 1945 increased to 12,615,119 pounds, compared with 10,552,932 the previous year. Mail transported declined to 6,418,944 pounds from 7,296,265 in 1944.

Operating revenues of Canadian carriers increased to \$17,335,154 in 1945, compared with \$17,119,291 in 1944. Operating expenses decreased to \$17,520,689 from \$17,847,346, reducing the net operating deficit from \$728,055 to \$185,535.

Liberals Choose Candidate For Fifth Prince

Mr. Carroll Delaney, Summerside, was chosen as the Liberal candidate for the Fifth District of Prince in the forthcoming by-election at a party convention held at Bellefleur, Ontario, The Field House, last evening. Mr. Delaney was the unanimous choice of the meeting, his being the only name put forward with the exception of Mr. E. P. Foley who declined. The vacancy in this seat was caused by the recent death of Mr. D. F. McNeill, Progressive Conservative.

Mr. Delaney's nomination was moved by Mr. Norman MacLeod and seconded by Mr. Alban Arsenault.

Mr. Foley's nomination was moved by Mr. Donald Baker and seconded by Mr. Delaney. In declining Mr. Foley expressed regret at the death of Mr. D. F. McNeill, M.L.A. whom he praised as always having fought fair elections and having always been interested in the welfare of the town. Mr. Morley M. Bell, M.L.A., also spoke to that effect.

Mr. John E. Campbell, President of the East Prince Liberal Association, presided at the meeting.

Mr. Delaney is a telegraph operator with the Canadian National Railways stationed at Summerside. He is also a prominent fox rancher and a partner of the firm of Arsenault and Delaney, fish packers, whose plant was destroyed by fire last week. He is a son of Dr. and Mrs. Mark Delaney of this town. He was born at Wellington and educated at the local school. He also attended St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, N.B., and St. Thomas College, Chatham, N. B. He is a graduate of the Union Commercial College, Charlottetown. Mr. Delaney is 36 years of age, is married and has four children.—S.

Mine Union Chief Requests Conference With Interior Secy.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—John L. Lewis today requested a Nov. 1 conference with Interior Secretary J. A. Krug to reopen the miners' bituminous coal contract with the government.

The mine union chief charged that the government had breached the agreement reached last May 29 ending the 29-day soft coal strike. He gave Secretary Krug 10 days notice in requesting a negotiating conference.

Mr. Lewis, back at his office after recovering from an appendicitis operation Sept. 27, disclosed that he had had a meeting with Mr. Krug Saturday and said the secretary "again refused to correct the unilateral misinterpretations" of the contract which he laid to Mr. Krug.

The points on which Mr. Lewis accused the government coal mines administration of breaching the contract were:

1. Interpretation of pro-rata vacation payments.
2. Setting up railroad weights rather than tippie weights for computing payments due the miners welfare and retirement fund.
