In Memoriam

MRS VERNER J. MURRAY

Death took place under very sad circumstances at Norwood, Winnipeg, Man., on May 11th, 1926 of Mrs. Verner J. Murray, beloved wife of Verner J. Murray, pastor of the Church of Christ of that place. The late Mrs. Murray was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, and leaves to mourn her loss besides her sorrowing husband and infant son, Verner Alton, her father and mother several brothers and sisters. Mrs. Murray was a general favorite among the congregation to which her husband was pastor and all those who had the pleasure of her acquaintance were helped by her sweet life for to know her was to love her and the life she lived was an inspiration for the better life beyond.

In her passing, this world is the loser of one of earth's sweetest flowers and Heaven is the sweeter of her presence. A short service was held at her late home, after which the body accompanied by her bereaved husband left for Rodney, Ontario, where interment took place. On the following Sunday evening, the three "Churches of Christ" in the city of Winnipeg united in a memorial service for her who was so loyal to His Service the church being beautifully decorated for the occasion. This was a fitting memorial of her beautiful life. The late Mrs. Murray spent the summer of 1923 on the island with her husband at the home of Mr. Murray, St. Eleanor's, P. E. I.

MR. E. H. NORTON

The following notices re the death of the late E. H. Norton appear in Los Gatos, California, newspaper of May 27th: "Following a short illness, Evered H. Norton, President of the Norton Phelps Lumber Company, and a prominent figure in Los Gatos, died Tuesday afternoon at 12:30 o'clock at the Lane Hospital, San Francisco, of peritonitis. The funeral will be held this Friday morning at 10 o'clock from St. Luke's Episcopal church, Los Gatos, with interment in the Los Gatos cemetery.

While Mr. Norton had not been feeling very well for some time, his condition was not considered serious even when he left Tuesday for Lane Hospital. He was operated on Wednesday morning, but never rallied from the operation. Evered Hamilton Norton was born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, on February 23rd, 1860. He came to this district in 1919 from Arizona, where he had engaged in the lumber business. Prior to living in Arizona, he had been engaged in banking in Colorado. In Los Gatos he bought out the Bryant Lumber Company, and founded the Los Gatos Lumber Company. The business expanded rapidly under his direction, and yards were established at Santa Cruz and Aptos.

Mr. Norton took an active interest in local affairs, through the Chamber of Commerce and other bodies, and was prominent in the Episcopal church. He was senior warden of St. Luke's. His outspoken honesty and social qualities won him a wide circle of friends, by whom he will be greatly missed. He was at one time president of the Los Gatos Merchants Association, and it was largely through his efforts that the signs in San Francisco advertising Los Gatos were underwritten. Mr. Norton is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Norton, a daughter, Mrs. Grace Norton Phelps, wife of H. K. Phelps of the Norton Phelps Company, and by a son, Jack Norton, who resides in Santa Cruz.

The Norton Phelps Lumber Company will continue in its present form, with Jack Norton and H. K. Phelps as partners. In memory of Evered H. Norton, to whose public spirit the National Guard Armory on Lyndon street in its present form is largely due, the dedication of that structure has been postponed one week, to Saturday evening, June 5th. This action was taken by unanimous vote of the company at its last drill, when the sad news of Mr. Norton's death was announced, although postponement involved notifying many high officers and the companies in other clubs.

Preparations had been completed for an elaborate hall and other features of entertainment. Captain H. K. Phelps, business partner of Mr. Norton in the Norton Phelps Lumber Company, is joining the company as second lieutenant, accepting the reduction in rank in order to serve the National Guard.

Mr. Norton who was born in Roseneath near Georgetown, was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Norton. He first attended the district school till fifteen years of age, when he came to Charlottetown, and entered the employ of the late Mr. W. E. Burke (now the firm of Pennell & Chandler) hardware merchants here. Here he remained some years then entered into partnership with his brother the late Mr. Rupert B. Norton, under the firm and style of Norton Bros. Later Mr. Norton retired from the firm and carried on a commission business for a number of years in this city. Then with Mrs. Norton and family he left his native land in the year 1900 and went to California, where he resided until his demise.
