## Poi And Salmon

### Hawaii's Best Dish

HONOLULU, Oct. 15.—The trouble with serving the Hawaiian national dishes—poi and lomilomi salmon—in other parts of the world is that few persons born outside the Hawaiian Islands like poi.

Poi, however, is the Hawaiian staff of life. Everything the old time Hawaiians eat is served as a side dish to poi. It is a gray, paste like material, made by pounding the root of the taro plant. It is eaten with the fingers, and choice determines its thickness. It may be of one-finger, two-finger or three-finger consistency.

The preparation of lomilomi salmon is simple. Uncooked salt salmon is picked into small bits. Chopped tomatoes and onions are added.

By no means are poi and lomilomi salmon mixed. It is culinary sacrilege in Hawaii to take poi other than straight.

### U. S. Citizens Demand Taxes Reduction

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 11.—Unless the administration yields to the demands for a further reduction of taxes at an early date, it looks as if there would be a stormy time in Congress this winter over the tax reduction question.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina, former chairman of the Finance Committee of the Senate, recently set the ball rolling and demanded, in view of large outlays at the end of the last fiscal year and in the present one, there be a heavy reduction of taxes again this winter for the relief of overburdened taxpayers. He also demanded the time for paying off the United States public debt be extended so as to give further relief to the taxpayers.

President Coolidge and Andrew Mellon, secretary of the treasury, have been resisting this demand, despite the fact that the administration now admits the surplus for the year will be in excess of \$185,000,000. The Democratic leaders charge the administration is trying to delay tax revision until just before the presidential campaign of 1928 in order that the President can then take credit for a lowering of taxes at a time when it will gain him votes.

Whatever the reasons for the delay of the administration in assenting to tax reduction, it looks as if the problem would be made easier if the problem would be made easier which will give the Republican leaders much embarrassment. This will be the case if the administration persists in refusing to lower ship taxes and the public keeps on demanding that taxes be lowered.

Democratic chiefs in Congress and some of the Progressive Republicans plan to keep stirring up tax relief through the campaign. Not only that but they plan to keep stirring it continually through the coming short session. This will, it is expected, prove highly troublesome to the administration and the Republican leaders, who apprehend it will strike a responsive chord in the hearts of the public.

### SCIENTIST FINDS BATS DESTROY CODDLING MOTHS

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 14.—Bats can reduce to a minimum the havoc wrought on the apple crops by the coddling moth, declares Dr. Charles A. R. Campbell, San Antonio bat authority.

The coddling moth is particularly pernicious to the apple-growing districts of the Pacific Northwest. Dr. Campbell and W. Kelly Price, apple-grower of Selas, Wash., conducted tests which satisfied them that the bat can eradicate the coddling moth as it does many malaria-carrying mosquitos in South Texas.

Price said, the doctor some of the coddling moths and some guano from bats of the Yakima valley. It was in the microscope examination of this excretion that it was ascertained that the food of bats in that vicinity was almost 95 percent coddling moths.

**ODD JOBS OF WOMEN.**

UTRECHT, Oct. 15.—Miss Rita Spanjaard knows more about cheese (than any other woman in Holland) (She is director of a cheese control station and the first woman cheeseologist in the world.)

No cheese in the Utrecht region no matter how strong-minded, can slip past Miss Spanjaard and across the sea, unless she gives it a passport. It has to be a genuine farm cheese with a Dutch accent, strong enough, just large enough, just rich enough to get a clearance.

During a year's time, Miss Spanjaard pronounces life and death sentences upon millions of cheeses. And so carefully does she finger-press the cheeses, as it were, that she could recognize any cheese from her home town, even on Broadway. By deciphering an easy code stamped into its rind, she can tell exactly from what Utrecht farm it came, the date it left home, the cow it came from, the herd to which the cow belonged and its rating.

When Miss Spanjaard took control ten years ago, only 250 farmers were subject to inspection. Now 2,500 in the Utrecht district alone avail themselves of the inspection.

This feminine dictator is a graduate of the University of Utrecht with a degree in science and, if she is somewhat formidable to a cheese, she is extremely attractive to behold—young, pretty and dressed in the Parisian manner.

### To Call National Convention

The committee appointed to arrange a national convention of the Conservative party are—British Columbia, Hon. H. H. Stevens; Alberta, Hon. R. B. Bennett; Saskatchewan, Senator Gillies; Manitoba, Hon. Robert Rogers; Ontario, W. A. Hoy; Quebec, Senator Murray MacLaren; Nova Scotia, Hon. W. A. Black; Prince Edward Island, Hon. J. A. Macdonald. This committee held their first meeting here last week, and decided to commence organization for the convention when Parliament opens in December. It is believed the convention will be called for June, and that it will be held either in Winnipeg or Toronto. The West is making a strong bid for the national convention.

The gathering was a marked success, and there is among the members confidence in a justification of the party's acts and policies at the first opportunity. From Quebec and the Maritime Provinces the demand that Mr. Meighen retain the leadership was almost unanimous. Quebec representatives said that Mr. Meighen was gaining steadily in their province, and the Conservative defeat there was not due to him personally. He, they claimed, had polled as large a vote as any other Conservative leader would have done.

There was little discussion among the representatives as to the choice of a permanent leader to make a more considered decision, eight months hence, and that until then party organization should be the object. By the time the national convention comes it is believed there will have arisen a definite trend toward one of several mentioned for the position. There appears little doubt that either Ontario or the West will furnish the next chief of the Conservative party.
