—ASK FREE TRADE IN BULK FICTION BE RE-ESTABLISHED

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—An appeal has been made to the governor-general-in-council against the recent ruling of the board of customs with respect to the tariff on fiction magazines. The action of the board is protested by the Canadian Wholesale News Dealers' Association.

The appeal asks that the ruling of the board which transferred certain monthly publications from the magazine to the fiction classification be rescinded. Magazines on the Canada duty free, but there is a tariff on fiction.

If a hearing is granted it means that the cabinet or a committee of the cabinet will hear the case and the plea of the applicants. If it so decides the committee can advise the governor-in-council to rescind the order of the board.

The applicants claim that the customs board has gone over parliament's head to make articles dutiable which parliament placed in the free list.

CANADIAN INDIANS AS AGRICULTURISTS

A report of the Canadian Department of Indian Affairs states that agricultural conditions on the reserves in Ontario have very much improved in the last five or six years. There are a great many more Indians farming at the present time than there were a few years ago. The number of stock on some of the reserves has more than doubled.

Swine Show And Sale Great Success

REMARKABLE QUALITY, SHARP BIDDING AND SATISFACTORY PRICES, FEATURED IN SWINE CLASSIC

The Agricultural Hall, Charlottetown was a scene of great activity and interest on Tuesday, October 25th, when the first Annual Swine Show and Sale was staged, under the auspices of the P. E. Island Swine Growers Association. This was one day, at least, in the year, when the hog was king.

It is said that a hog should receive chastisement whenever he comes within striking distance as a reward for his well known propensities for getting into trouble, and possibly this would express the sentiments of those who live in close proximity, as their slumbers and reveries were rudely disturbed on the early hours of Tuesday by the audible objections of our porcine friend, as he was being unloaded from his crate to the pens which had been carefully prepared for his reception. Anyone who cared however to view the scene within, would quickly conclude, from the careful grooming and tender solicitude which each animal was receiving at the hands of the attendant owners, that they were sadly mistaken in their conclusions and that these were no ordinary low-brow animals to receive such expert attention. And in this respect they would be quite correct, for gathered together on this occasion were the upper crust of the hog industry, the aristocrats of Island swinehood, whose pedigrees traced back many generations, through blue-blooded ancestry to a few of the outstanding strains that are spoken of with great respect by the hog fanciers of the Province. The Show and Sale, which was the first of its kind ever to be held here, was undoubtedly a great success, and justifies continuance and enlargement in succeeding years.

It was made possible by the financial support of the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture, the officials of which carried out its arrangements with untiring indefatigability to make it a success. Boars and sows were consigned by breeders from various parts of the Province, and it is interesting to note that breeders who have had no previous experience in showing, but who have been producing high class material to meet the requirements of the commercial trade, were able to compete successfully against old and tried exhibitors. This fact has provided wonderful encouragement to these men and should be an inspiration to farmers throughout the Province, who, though their location and other circumstances, do not feel the influence of our exhibitions, to breed and develop their hogs in conformity with market standards and improved breeding and feeding practices.

A few years ago it was impossible to go to outlying sections of the Province and pick out breeding hogs of high quality calibre. In many sections the hog industry has undergone a complete metamorphosis, and while a great measure of praise for this transformation is due to the breeders themselves, the lions share should go to these men in our Public Departments, who have applied policies designed for purposes of improvement, and by patience, perseverance and application have assisted our breeders on to a higher vantage ground in the swine industry.

The hogs shown this feature, exemplified the very highest type of Yorkshire, and showed the thoroughness and skill with which progress has been accomplished.

In all, about fifty animals were shown, divided about equally between males and females. The judging which commenced at ten o'clock, was performed by Mr. F. W. Walsh, formerly connected with the Swine Division at Truro, and now Eastern Agricultural Agent with the Canadian National Railways. Mr. Walsh was pleasantly surprised with the quality of the animals shown and thought the Show the premier swine exhibit of Eastern Canada. The rewards in many instances, were only separated by a shade.

In the male classes, the majority of the top places were won by breeders from New Glasgow District. These hogs were uniformly excellent and were shown in first class style. They reflected the value of breeding. The foundation for most of this material was of the old Morvin Duke Alderwood, Right sort and other strains, on which was crossed the Brethour bred Boar, Oak Lodge Masterpieces 134. This breeding has been wonderfully productive in point of excellence, and not only carried its products to the premier positions in the Class, but has been responsible as well for the export of a large percentage of select hogs from this particular district.

The top boar, a wonderfully smooth strong bowed animal, was owned by Reginald McNeill, North Rustico, while Walter Buntain, of the same locality came second, losing to his neighbor by a mere shade. Third place was captured by the veteran exhibitor, Almond Boswell on a Morvin Duke entry of good substance and finish, while the next three places went to Ashford Andrews, Ernest Houston and Raymond Roper, respectively, new exhibitors of the New Glasgow group. These men from the north certainly were on the "hogs back" on this occasion. The other placings are itemized below.

The high spots of the sale were:

1 The excellence of arrangement

2 The high quality of the offerings

3 The recognition of Island breeding from without the Province. Many of the boars went to purchasers in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec and as far as Minnesota.

4 The top-notch prices for real classy-top-notch hogs. This should be a wonderful incentive for breeders to plan for next year's big hog classic, same place, only bigger and better.

(5) What's the matter with the members of the Hunter River Shipping Club? Well, nothing, only they took 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th, 8th, 11th, 16th, and 18th, in Boars, and 1st, 5th, and 11th, and a whole lot more in sows, and new exhibitors at that, and on top of it bought one of the highest priced boars at the sale to take back home to still further improve their stock.

This is really something worthy of notice, and these fellows deserve a whole lot of credit for their progressiveness and initiative.
